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try, and came to a close with his death on Nov. 23, 1941. He rose through the ranks to the position of commander of the 41st (Sunset) Division, composed basically of National Guard units from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

"Service with the artillery came in the Spanish-American war when General White volunteered for duty with the Utah Artillery.

Long in Service

"His association with the Oregon National Guard—he was adjutant general of Oregon from 1915 to the date of his death—started Aug. 4, 1907 when he enlisted in the old 3rd Oregon Infantry and, at the same time, was commissioned a first lieu-

tenant in infantry. Promotion to captain came March 21, 1911. "On Feb. 1, 1915, he was named adjutant general but took leave of absence from this position for duty on the Mexican border from July 27, 1916, to Feb. 22, 1917. Returning from the border, he resumed his position as adjutant general.

"Under General White's supervision, the 3rd Oregon (now the 162nd Infantry) was mobilized overnight and was the first National Guard regiment in the nation to be ready for the service when the call to arms was sounded for the World war. He entered federal service with the rank of major as assistant adjutant of the 41st Division, and served overseas from Jan. 19, 1919, to June 18, 1919, in this capacity and also in the adjutant general's department on the staff of General Pershing. While overseas he was promoted to the grade of lieutenant colonel. For exceptional service to the allies, the French decorated him with the Cross of the Black Star and the Cross of the Legion of Honor.

Many Promotions

"He was mustered out in July, 1919, and resumed duties as adjutant general in April, 1920. His commission as a colonel in the adjutant general's depart-

ment came in June, 1920. In 1923 he was appointed a brigadier general of the line and assigned to command the 82nd Brigade of the 41st Division, and Jan. 3, 1930, was appointed a major general of the line and assigned to command the division which was called into federal service Sept. 16, 1940.

"One of the organizers of the American Legion, General White along with Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt called the Paris caucus of the Legion and served as its first vice-commander and adjutant.

"General White was born July 18, 1880, on a farm in Mason county, Illinois.

"In civil life he did pen and ink drawings for the Salt Lake City Tribune, and in 1904 he started as a reporter for the Oregonian in Portland. In his 11 years with that paper he served as reporter, assistant city editor, Sunday editor, and associate editor.

"An author of note, he wrote under the pen name of Ared White. He wrote fiction, both novels and short stories, as well as articles for magazines.

"He was a member of the Military Order of the World War, the American Legion, the Shrine, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

DERELICT BLIMP LANDS DALY CITY; OFFICERS VANISH

San Francisco, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Two naval officers, missing when their crewless and broken blimp floated in from the ocean and descended on a street in suburban Daly City, were hunted at sea off the Golden Gate today.

The blimp had been on a routine anti-submarine patrol flight. Two life belts were missing from the craft when it landed, but all of the parachutes and the rubber lift raft were found in the gondola where the two officer-crewmembers rode.

The blimp, sagging in the middle, with big tears visible in its fabric and with its two motors idle, drifted in from the Pacific yesterday morning, five hours after it had taken off on a flight.

The craft wandered along at tree top height, left one of its depth charges on the Lakeside golf course when a bomb rack scraped the ground, and drew a crowd of hundreds who followed it by automobile and street car before it settled to earth in nearby Daly City.

There was considerable damage to the fabric and gondola, but navy maintenance men said the ship could be put back into service.

One depth charge still in the bomb rack under the gondola offered no hazard, inasmuch as it would explode only under water at considerable depth, naval men said. The depth charge left on the golf course likewise did not endanger anyone.

KURT MITCHELL IN COAST GUARD NOW

Word has been received from Portland that Kurt Mitchell, son of Mrs. Anna Mitchell of Medford, has been enlisted in the U. S. coast guard and will receive schooling in cooking and baking at Seattle preparatory to entering the service as a second class petty officer, second cook.

Mitchell and his wife moved from here to Portland two and a half years ago, and since the first of the year he has been employed in a Portland shipyard. His wife is an employee of Bonneville in Portland.

He is the second son of Mrs. Mitchell to enter the armed forces. Her youngest son, Herbert, was in the army and was at Corregidor when it fell to the Japs. No word has been received from him since last November other than the war department's report of all regarded as missing until the casualty list and the list of prisoners is received through Geneva, Switzerland, from the Japanese government.

CAPT. HART ENDS TRAINING PERIOD

Having completed a six-weeks course of military instruction and physical conditioning at the army air force officer training school at Miami Beach, Fla., Capt. Floyd Hart of Central Point was recently graduated with his class in the air forces of the army according to word received from the training school.
