

Norm Worthley Named Crater Boss As Army Calls Dutch Lieber

CATCHER TO TAKE REINS IN CLASH HERE WEDNESDAY

Klamath Coming For "Lieber Night" Tilt — Big Dutch to Receive Present.

When the Medford Craters, Oregon-California league pennant winners, face the Klamath Falls Pelicans here tomorrow night in the first of a three-game series for the president's cup, they'll be under the leadership of a new manager—Norman Worthley, the hard-hitting bullet-headed catcher.

The Crater players, given the privilege of electing their own skipper to succeed Dutch Lieber, who leaves here Thursday for Oakland, Calif., to report for induction in the army, unanimously selected Worthley, junior high coach, to guide them through the remainder of the 1942 season.

According to Cliff Proctor, president of the Medford Athletic association, Worthley will take over the Crater reins immediately, and will boss the club in Wednesday's "Lieber Night" game so designated in honor of the big fellow whose pitching led the Craters to the second-half state league flag last year, and whose hitting and grand leadership contributed greatly to the locals' drive for the Oregon-California loop burlap this season.

In the seventh inning of tomorrow night's argument the Medford Athletic association, team sponsor, will present to big Dutch a gift symbolic of the gratitude the association and all fans feel for what he has done for baseball here, this season and last.

The game, which starts at 9 o'clock sharp, will find either Lieber, Norman Lewis, or Lieber, himself, on the firing line for the Craters. Lewis pitched the pennant-clincher Saturday night, giving the Pelicans only three hits for a 3 to 1 Crater victory. Lieber, bothered by a sore flipper most all season, says his arm feels fairly strong and allows as how he might be able to work against Ernie Bishop's outfit.

The Pelicans will send either Virgil Haynes or Kenny Benham to the mound against the locals. Haynes was the victim of that 3-1 Crater victory, while Benham stopped the locals in the Sunday affair, 8 to 7.

Service Elevens Draw Men From Almost Every College

New York, Aug. 18.—(AP)—When Col. Robert Newland and Maj. Wallace Wade were named coaches of the all-army football team they were handed a well-indexed list of 1,800 soldier-gridders, all formerly in the star category, from which to draw their squad.

The navy, marine and coast guard branches possibly have attracted an equal number, making 3,600 footballers headlines now wearing uniforms of a different sort.

Although there is no way of determining it exactly, it is likely that 700 of those 3,600 would be in school and getting their bumps and bruises for dear ol' Siwash this fall instead of for Uncle Sam if the world were at peace.

An Associated Press survey shows that virtually every college contributed to the armed services at least one "hidden" who still was eligible to play and that at least two top flight schools—Fordham and Virginia—handed over their captains-elect.

The Rams will have to do without Jim Lansing, an end, this fall and Virginia will go along without Bill Suhling, a rousing center.

Double graduations, one in the spring and the other in June, left the U. S. Military Academy and the U. S. Naval Academy with little semblance of the elevens they fielded in 1941. Gridders who were sophomores there last season will be seniors this fall.

Although Uncle Sam tapped at least one footballer at almost all colleges, he drew more from some than from others. Penn State lost six while Pennsylvania has back all of those on whom it was counting.

Jim Hurnett, who was to have been to Santa Clara this fall when Norman Standee was to Stanford two seasons ago, enlisted. . . . Washington will miss 10 players, six of whom definitely would have made Ralph (Pete) Welch's first year happier. . . . Among the sextet was Bob Barrett, sophomore halfback terror of 1941. . . . Georgetown turned over 14 athletes but George Washington, it, the same city, came through virtually unscathed. . . . Mississippi, where there were hopes of one of the best elevens in the school's history, gave up 25. . . . Mississippi State, where the talent was meager, lost only a few. . . . Harvard, with a strong ROTC unit, got off lightly but Dartmouth saw 20 marching away and Wesleyan of Middletown, Conn., lost its entire first string line. . . .

BROOKLYN BULGE SLICED AS CARDS WHIP REDS, 5-2

Dodgers Now Lead by Seven and Half Games—Yankees Blank A's 15 to 0.

If the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers don't meet in the world series this fall, they'll waste a grudge that would be worth more at the box office than all the 300 hitters on both clubs.

Born in the post-season classic last October but lost amid the pennant squabbles of the current campaign, the ill-feeling has come out of retirement and shows signs of snowballing into quite a fuss.

Meanwhile, the St. Louis Cardinals aren't conceding the Dodgers the National league pennant. With Brooklyn idle yesterday, the Cards sliced the Dodger lead to seven and a half games by whipping the Cincinnati Reds, 5-2, to sweep a four-game series.

Giants Win
In the only other "national league game, the New York Giants tightened their grip on third place, four games ahead of Cincinnati, by edging out the Boston Braves, 3-2.

The Yankees played their last game of the season in Philadelphia, swamping the Athletics, 15-0, as Red Ruffing hurled his fourth shutout of the year and the 42nd of his career.

The St. Louis Browns came from behind twice to beat the Cleveland Indians, 5-2, in a night game, the only other contest on the schedule.

BASIL JAMES IS ARMY INDUCTEE

James was the tenth leading rider in the United States last season, shepherding 110 of his 696 mounts to the winner's circle. Prizes won by his 1941 mounts totaled \$246,335.

BOEING PLANS TO BAN FRIVOLITY FOR WOMEN HELP

Seattle, Aug. 18.—(P)—It's too bad, but the girls aren't working out any too well in the vast plant where the army's crack bombers, the flying fortresses, are made.

H. Oliver West, executive vice-president and guiding genius of production at the Boeing Aircraft company, said today that although some women were doing fine work, a great many "are here for other than serious purposes."

They pursue social life in the factory workrooms, it appears; they will not wear proper clothing, as suggested by the personnel office; and they do not confine their permanent waves in nets, nor even snoods, although they've been told time and again that long flowing bobs are apt to get caught, painfully, in machinery. They are, in fact, said West, "youngsters in search of a good time."

Nevertheless, West concedes that it is absolutely essential to utilize woman-power to keep production of the famous Boeing flying fortresses up to par. As of this month, 26 per cent of all employees at Boeing are women, and the percentage probably will increase, he said.
