Miss Marjorie Kelly, head of the girls' physical education department of junior high school has entered her resignation to take up camp exchange work at Camp White. Miss Kelly has been a member of the junior high faculty for the past 12 years. She will be replaced by Mrs. Phyllis Hawk who taught last year at Oak Grove school.

Miss Mary Ellen Eberhart, instructor in art at junior high school has resigned her position and will be married in the near future. Mrs. Ursula Ogle, who has been teaching leisure arts at Jackson school, has been selected to fill this vacancy.

Resignation of Mrs. Wilma Kincaid, Spanish and English teacher at the high school, was also announced with Miss Carol H. Snyder of Los Angeles to replace Mrs. Kincaid.

BOEING MANAGER RENIGS ON SLUR OF LADY TOILERS

Seattle, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Take it easy girls; the Boeing aircraft executive who spoke disparagingly of feminine frivolity on the assembly line didn't mean to cast a reflection on the ability of the sex.

Reverberations from across the country led H. Oliver West, executive vice president of the Boeing company, to issue a statement last night that "on the whole, our women employees are doing an excellent job. The use of women has proved so satisfactory in general that we expect within a few months to have 50 per cent or more of our entire factory payroll made up of women workers."

He was quoted yesterday, following an interview with a touring group of women reporters, as belittling the flirtatious attitude of many girls in the aircraft plant. Reports to the contrary flooded the news wires from other air plants around the nation.

In Washington, D. C., Mary Anderson, head of the women's division, even suggested that "it would seem Mr. West is one of those men who didn't want women in the plant in the first place."

JAP PROPAGANDA WAYS TOLD CLUB

Current Japanese propaganda methods were discussed before the Medford Rotary club Tuesday noon at the Hotel Medford by Dan Bowerman, representative of the United Press, San Francisco bureau. Transcriptions of broadcasts from Radio Tokyo, picked up by the western listening post of the United Press, were played by Mr. Bowerman to illustrate the type of programs emanating from Japan.

Major General Charles Gerhardt, commander of the 91st division, and Colonel Fenton Jacobs, chief of staff, also participated in the Tuesday program. Frank J. Newman, after a brief outline of the aims and objects of Rotary, International, formally received into the club five new members: General Gerhardt, Colonel Jacobs, Capt. Vernon Jaeger, division chaplain, Shelby Tuttle, Southern Oregon sales executive, and Fred Morris, Southern Pacific agent.
