

Craters and Pelicans Clash in "Lieber Night" Contest Tonight.

FIRST FRAGAS OF CUP SERIES WILL START AT 9 P. M.

Tribute To Be Paid Big Dutch—Lieut. Lewis or Lieber To Hurl For Locals.

Tribute will be paid Big Dutch Lieber, Medford's slugging first-baseman-pitcher, when the Oregon-California league champion Craters clash with the Klamath Falls Pelicans at the fairgrounds park tonight in the first game of a three-game series for the President's cup. The tilt starts at 9 o'clock sharp.

Leaving early tomorrow morning for Oakland, Cal., to report for induction into the army, Lieber will be honored by "Dutch Lieber Night," and in the seventh inning will receive a gift from the Medford Athletic association, team sponsor. Big Dutch managed the Craters to the O-C loop gonfalon this season.

Norm Worthley, elected Crater manager for the balance of the season, said today that either Lieut. Norman Lewis, the 91st division southpaw, or Lieber himself would elbow against Manager Ernie Bishop's Pelicans. The Klamath club will send either Virgil Haynes or Kenny Benham against the locals.

Probable Lineups
In case Lewis hurls for the champions, the lineup will probably be Worthley, catcher; Lieber, first base; Gitzon, second base; Swartz, shortstop; Fawcett, third base; Waite, leftfield; Wray, centerfield; and Madden, Swanson, Hafford or Fleishman, rightfield. If Lieber pitches, Fleishman will undoubtedly hold down first base.

The Pelicans are expected to take the field with Gray catching, Crapo on first, Bishop on second, Larsen on short, Gross on third, Eystone in left, Hatfield in center and Goddard in right.

The Craters clinched the pennant last Saturday night by whipping the Pelicans, 3 to 1, on Lewis' three-hit flinging job, in which he bested Haynes, who gave up seven blows.

Second game of the President's cup series will be played at Klamath Falls Saturday night. In case a third and deciding game is necessary, it will be staged here Sunday, August 30.

Grid Games Moved To Fans To Cope With Travel Curb

New York, Aug. 19.—(P)—Moving the football games to the spectators instead of having the spectators move to the war-inspired travel restrictions.

Although virtually every coach and athletic director polled by the Associated Press expressed optimism regarding attendance and gate receipts for the coming season, many of them either had moved a contest to a large city or was contemplating such a switch.

Even the staid Big Ten approved the transfer of the Ohio State-Illinois fracas from small Champaign, Ill., to much bigger Cleveland.

It was the coaches of colleges in the smaller towns who were pessimistic.

Bernie Moore of Louisiana State figured that gate receipts for the Tigers' home games would be off from 25 to 40 per cent because of Baton Rouge's small size, plus the tire and gas situation. Mike Ahearn, veteran Kansas State director, estimated his club's home receipts at Manhattan, Kas., "might be cut in half."

Army guessed the crowds at its three West Point battles would be off 30 per cent. Their sentiments contrasted sharply with the majority, especially with the ones expressed by officials at schools in Boston, New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas, Minneapolis, Washington, Baltimore, Atlanta and New Orleans.

But just in case their optimism might be of the morning glory variety many of the directors made schedule shifts in hopes of insuring profitable gates.

West Virginia, unable to get an attractive "breather" for its home field on October 3, agreed to play in Boston college's stadium; Maryland moved the Rutgers game to Baltimore and the Florida contest to Washington; Pennsylvania and Army will play in Philadelphia instead of at West Point; Princeton is bringing both the Army and the Navy games to New York's Yankee stadium.

Stanford will play Santa Clara and the University of Washington at San Francisco instead of at Palo Alto; Alabama moved two games from Tuscaloosa; Mississippi took its game with Georgia to Memphis and it is possible the Ole Miss-Vanderbilt tussle will be decided on the same field; Texas A. & M. and Rice collide at Houston instead of College Station in other site changes.

GRAIN FIELDS HIT

CARDINALS BLANK CHICAGO, 5-0 TO TIGHTEN BATTLE

Lanier Hurls Seven-Hitter—Dodgers Dropped by Phils—Yankees Beaten.

After nearly everybody except their relatives had given them up for lost, the St. Louis Cardinals are threatening at last to make a race out of the National league pennant drive.

With Southpaw Max Lanier hurling seven-hit shutout ball, the Cards ran their latest winning streak to five in a row last night by beating the Chicago Cubs and Claude Passeau, 5-0.

The Dodgers dropped into Philadelphia for a one-night stand and were jolted, 3-1, by the Phils, whom they had expected to roll over and play dead.

While the Dodgers can look for trouble in their remaining six meetings with the Cards, they also have a problem close to home in the surprising New York Giants.

The Giants, in third place and unwilling to vacate without a struggle, have won and lost eight with the Dodgers and still have eight more battles scheduled with the flatbush flock.

Hubbell Wins

Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 10-2 triumph over the Boston Braves yesterday, scattering six hits as his boss, Mel Ott, chipped in with his 21st home run and took over the leadership of the league. The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped Cincinnati five games behind the Giants by whitewashing the Reds, 3-0, on the six-hit hurling of Johnny Lanning in another night contest.

In the American league, the Boston Red Sox ran their winning streak to five games by edging out the New York Yankees, 8-7, in ten innings. Johnny Peacock doubled off Pitcher Johnny Murphy in the tenth and scored the winning run on Dom Dimaggio's outfield fly, handing the veteran Yankee fireman his seventh straight defeat.

Denny Galehouse turned in a seven-hit shutout in a night contest as the St. Louis Browns whipped the Chicago White Sox, 7-0, and climbed to within a single game of the third-place Cleveland Indians, who were idle.

The Washington Senators came from behind to trip the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1, in another night tilt, with Alex Carrasquez shading Phil Marchildon in a mound duel.

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Beavers Drop 4 to 1 Contest to Seattle; Angels Add To Lead

The Seattle Rainiers defeated the Portland Beavers 4-1 in Pacific Coast League baseball last night but they lost ground in their desperate race to overtake the leading Los Angeles Angels.

The Angels, led by heavy hitting Eddie Mayo, increased their lead to four games over Sacramento and nine over Seattle by winning a doubleheader from the San Francisco Seals, 2-1 and 12-3.

The Rainiers took only an hour and 36 minutes to best the league stragglers Beavers in a tight pitching duel between Seattle's Larry Guay, who yielded only four hits, and Ad Liska, who allowed only seven.

Jo Jo White led the Rainier stockmen with a first inning score and the winning tally in the sixth when Liska wild pitched twice after White doubled.

Sacramento also won but lost ground to the Angels with a 4-1 victory over San Diego behind the three-hit hurling of Kemp Wicker.

Hollywood batters rallied in the seventh after being shut out for six innings and pounded Vince Di Biasi, Oakland hurler, for four runs to win, 6-2.

VICTIM HUSBAND'S JEALOUSY DIES

Rollo W. Ellis, 47, Portland, customer in an ice cream parlor during a shooting affray Saturday night, died last night of wounds which Detective Collie Stoops said were inflicted by Ennis E. Gabriel, 49, store proprietor.

Stoops said Gabriel also shot his wife and Patrolman Ralph Gray and was wounded by Gray before turning his gun on himself. He is in a hospital under guard.

Gabriel, Mrs. Gabriel and Gray were reported in improved condition.

Stoops said that Gabriel, in a jealous rage, opened fire on his wife and Ellis. Gray rushed into the establishment and was hit by a bullet. He returned Gabriel's fire, wounding him. Gabriel then shot himself in the head.

Gabriel's bedside guard was doubled after he attempted to wrest the gun of a lone patrolman.
