COAST JAPANESE GO TO CAMPS IN IDAHO, WYOMING

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Some 3,500 Washington and Oregon Japanese will be transferred to Wyoming and Idaho within the next three weeks, the Wartime Civil Control administration announced today.

Eleven hundred Japanese who formerly lived in central Washington, will be transferred from the Portland, Ore., assembly center about August 29 to the Heart Mountain relocation center at Vocation, Park county, Wyoming. The movement to the camp on the Shoshone river, 13 miles northwest of Cody, will take about two days.

Another 2,400 from northwestern Oregon will start moving September 6 from Portland to the Minidoka relocation center at Eden, Jerome county, Idaho. This site is 15 miles east of Twin Falls. The transfer will take about four days.

The Oregon Japanese were removed months ago from their homes in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Yamhill, Tillamook, Clatsop and Columbia counties.

Portland, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The Oregon State Teachers' association today conducted a survey of readjustments in the salaries of teachers in the state's school districts.

Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary, said that teachers are underpaid in normal times and now that the war is on salaries are even more inadequate.

Small districts operating on limited budgets which do not permit increased salaries are threatened with a teacher shortage, he said.

CHINESE FORCES RECAPTURE PLANT

Chungking, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Chinese forces have recaptured Wenchow, important port on the southern Chekiang province coast which the Japanese seized a month ago, the Chinese high command announced tonight.

Its communique, however, reported that Chinese defenders were compelled by heavy Japanese pressure to abandon Suichang, in southwestern Chekiang. The victory and defeat occurred the same day, last Saturday, the communique said.

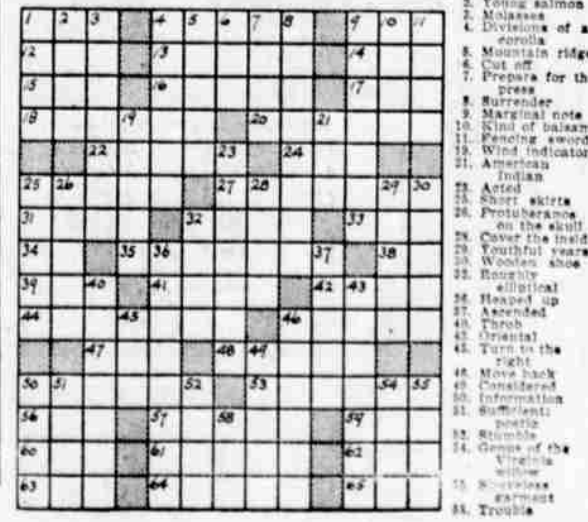

GEO. UPTON HERE TO START DUTIES AS USO DIRECTOR

Will Represent Y.M.C.A.—Pacific College Student—Much Experience.

George Upton of Brooklyn, New York, arrived in Medford yesterday where he will serve as USO director, representing the Y. M. C. A. in the service organization center. He comes to the USO center after many years experience in Y. M. C. A. activities and said today he is anxious to begin work in his new position.

Upton was for 19 years secretary of the Merchant Marine Y. M. C. A. in Seattle, Wash., and for the past two years has been executive secretary of the Bethel Ship Merchant Marine, Y. M. C. A. in Brooklyn. He is not a newcomer to the Pacific coast as he resided for eight years in Oregon and attended Pacific academy and Pacific college at Newberg and "is glad to get back to Oregon."

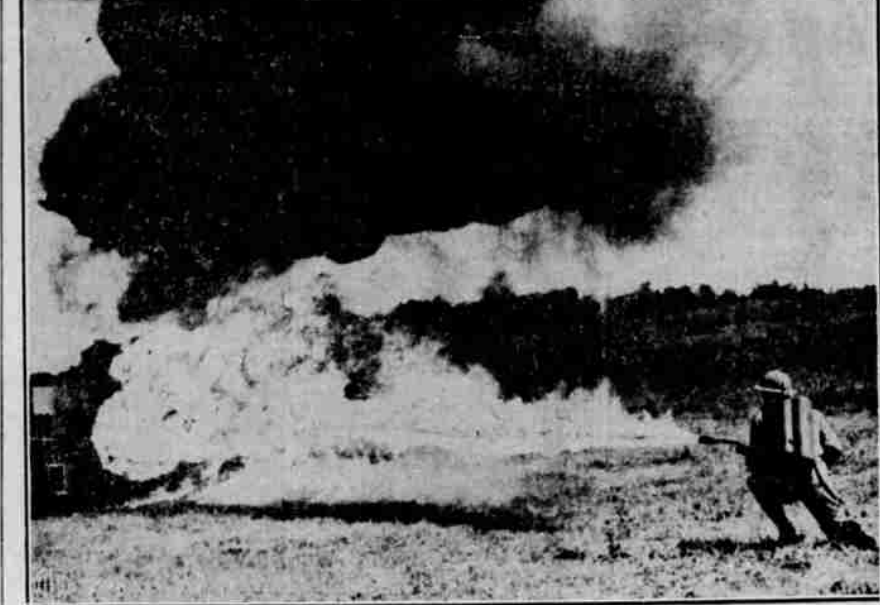
The new director said that he feels that USO, a combination of service organizations in the country, is one of the largest movements America has ever seen. It is the first time, he explained, when large social organizations have united in one movement and it is the greatest experiment in pure democracy that this country has ever undertaken. Upton stated that the presence of a large number of troops in the vicinity of Medford is indeed a "challenge to the community for everyone to work together in a spirit to accomplish."

Upton's arrival in Medford has been anticipated by the USO council for some time. The new director represents the Y. M. C. A., which had been designated at the beginning of USO activities in this city to handle the permanent center, the presence of Y. W. C. A. officials here being temporary. Mrs. Helen Small, who has acted as USO director under Y. W. C. A. has served efficiently in her capacity and with an anticipated USO program in Ashland, where the activity has been extended, is assisting with fundamental USO problems in that city.

Mr. Upton's wife and two children, Jerry, age 8 and Clara, age 12, are spending a short time in Seattle and plan to come to Medford in the near future to take up residence.
