Back in the groove after a disastrous series at Oakland, the Los Angeles Angels found home surroundings to their liking yesterday and grabbed a double-header from Hollywood, thereby stretching their Pacific Coast league lead to two and one-half games over the second-place Sacramento club.

The Angels took the opener from the Stars by a 5-1 count behind the steady hurling of Ken Raffensberger, then annexed the nightcap, 3-2, with Eddie Mayo batting in a pair of runs with a single in the first inning.

Sacramento, meanwhile, divided a twin bill with Seattle, losing the first contest, 4-1, and winning the second, 4-3.

San Francisco edged out Oakland in the opener, 4-3, then went down to defeat in the finale, 3-2.

San Diego swept two games from Portland, triumphing in the opener, 5-3, behind the hur-

ing of Frank Dasso and Norm Brown, and repeating in the nightcap, 11-3, on the basis of a 17-hit assault on Wayne Osborne. Bill Salkeld hit a homer for San Diego in the first game.

Five Transfers
Bolster Pelican
Football Squad

Current goings-on in Klamath Falls leave little doubt in the writer's purported mind that Ample Frank Ramsey and his Pelicans are coming to Medford the evening of October 16 "loaded."

Klamath scouts have gone over, not only that county but Siskiyou county in California as well, with a fine-tooth comb in search of hefty material for the Pelican pigskin squad, and if reports from there can be believed, the ivory-hunters were eminently successful.

No less than five potential

gridiron-greats have transferred from hinterland schools to big Klamath high, and big Mr. Ramsey isn't a bit unhappy about it all.

The typewriter of Bob Leonard, News-Herald sports editor, paints in glowing terms the prowess of one Gordon McKay from Henley, a six-foot-five-inch gent weighing 225 pounds, who desires to play some fullback for the Bigbills.

Glowa Robert: "He can pitch a football 60 yards and crowds 23 seconds in the 220. He weighs 225 and if he can learn to start with any degree of celerity may plug the hole left by graduation of Gene Love. He is nothing short of a powerhouse."

Less publicized, but rather expected to be almost as proficient on the turf, are Tackles Doug Clement, 195, Henley and James Conroy, 190, Chiloquin; and Backs Louis Beckers, 165, Chiloquin and Dick Rasmussen, 160, Tulelake, Calif.

These above-mentioned transfers are among the 65 candidates now working out, 14 of whom are lettermen. In the batch are three regulars of the 1941 eleven—Center Phil Blohn and Half-

backs Bill Christiansen and Don Mast, plus numerous others who saw considerable action. One of these is goggled Ralph Foster, who scampered 99 yards against Medford after catching a punt, remember?

The massive Mr. Ramsey is new at Klamath Falls this year. Last season he brought to Medford what he, and a lot of people upstate thought, was a terrific Corvallis aggregation. It might have been, at that, but the Black Tornado was unawed to the tune of 41 to 0. Copious Frank didn't like such business, neither did Corvallis, and that school decided not to play Medford any more.

Thus, although Corvallis is no longer on the Tornado schedule, Mr. Ramsey finds that he is, and the local populace can rest assured that Klamath Falls, this season, will probably be tougher and more determined to stop the Tigers than any Pelican team has been in the past. Frank Ramsey will see to that.

Two letters have been received, one from Dwight Catherwood and the other from Mickey Shader. Catherwood, ex-Phoenix high

coach and leftfielder for the Craters until the last month of the season, writes:

"I read where the Craters won the league championship and also the President's cup playoffs. Please convey my congratulations to the team and the association. I wish I could have been in on the kill. I have received my commission (navy) papers and am waiting for my orders to report." Dwight writes from Mill City, Oregon.

Shader, who conducted the annual Cincinnati Reds' tryout camp for young baseball players here this summer, writes:

"The attendance at my 10 camps on the coast and in the northwest was 265 players, 70 per cent below other years. Players signed were Leonard Neal, shortstop, Eugene Howard Lean, outfielder, Marysville, Wash., and William Boehler, Spokane, Wash."

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
