

WARREN CASE IN CONDEMNATION IS NEAR JURY HANDS

After hearing arguments of counsel all day yesterday and this morning, a U. S. district court jury was to receive its instructions from Judge James Alger Fee early this afternoon and retire to deliberate the condemnation case of the government versus R. and J. P. Warren, who are asking \$22,000 for 240 acres they formerly owned in the Camp White area, against the government offer of \$9,000.

The jury, as in all the condemnation suits, will decide on a fair and just compensation for the property. Defendants are represented by Attorney Charles W. Reames, the government by Bernard H. Ramsey and George Coddling. The Warren case has been the longest hush far in the series of suits.

The case of the government versus May E. Bowling, former owner of 70 acres in the cantonment area, was to be tried this afternoon while the Warren jury was deliberating. The defendant is represented by Attorney Edward C. Kelly.

Only business on the federal court docket for Saturday will be the empaneling by Judge Fee at 9 a. m. of a jury to hear the case of the government versus Esther and B. J. Palmer, and Ben Dawson, the case to be tried starting at 10 a. m. Monday.

It is a joint suit, the Palms formerly owning 367 acres and Dawson 885.56 acres in the cantonment area, making a total of 1,245.56 acres involved in the case. Represented by Attorney Kenneth G. Denman, the defendants are asking \$12,805.60 for the two tracts against the government offer of \$6,020. The Palms are asking \$3,750 against a \$2,000 offer for their land. Dawson \$8,855.60 against the government offer of \$4,020. In addition, the defendants are asking severance damage in the amount of \$800 involving 80 acres in the former Dawson tract that the government did not take last spring. The defense holds that the 80 acres have decreased in value due to their severance from the rest of the property.

TRESCOTT ARRAIGNED ON SECOND COMPLAINT

Charles R. Trescott, charged in a second complaint filed against him, with contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, was arraigned in justice court yesterday and given until next Monday to plead. He is free on \$1000 bonds. The first charge was dismissed by the court on the grounds of insufficient evidence after an extended preliminary hearing.

The pending charge concerns a different girl, authorities said.

relief work at Salt Lake City, headquarters for Utah, Nevada, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho.

On Air Corps Board

Returned to the 4th army at the Presidio, San Francisco, in charge of operations and training, Colonel Meredith was later the head of the war department board investigating and selecting air corps bases in several areas of the west. He served until May, 1942, as chief of staff of the ninth corps area at the Presidio, San Francisco, and Fort Douglas, Utah. In May, 1942 he came to Camp White as commanding officer, while the camp was in process of construction.

Colonel Meredith has long been an advocate of a sound military policy based upon universal military training along the general lines now in effect—namely, replacement training centers and separation of combat and administrative functions in order that combat troops may be free as possible from administrative and supply functions. This results in devotion of a maximum of attention to training and fighting. Colonel Meredith submitted basic principles and recommended such a general plan in May, 1940. Earlier, he recommended the principles and development of large scale smoke experiments for defense of the Panama Canal and later conducted the experiments in Panama.

Active in Athletics

Colonel Meredith's athletic activities include participation on high school, city and college baseball teams. He was a member of the class exhibition equitation team at West Point. He became golf champion of the Panama Golf Club in 1927 and according to his statement still likes to "try to play golf." The Colonel is an enthusiastic hunter of small game, and a fisherman, though he remarks the trout are too smart.

He was a member of the Lexington, Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce, and while stationed at Rockford, was associated with the Kiwanis Club. He is a member of the Elks, Odd Fellows and Masonic Lodges.
