YANKEES PARADE ON FRENCH SOIL

Brazzaville, Fighting French Equatorial Africa, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—United States troops today paraded on French soil with the cheers of the French people ringing in their ears for the first time since the A. E. F. landed in France in World War I.

It was disclosed that the American troops were stationed somewhere in fighting French Africa to help defend common interests of the United Nations.

The population of the colony, both French and native, was heartened by the sight of the well-equipped, sturdy American troops, who seemed eager to join their French comrades.

ASHLAND TAVERNS AGREE TO CLOSE UP AT 11 O'CLOCK

As a direct result of a brawl early Friday morning outside an Ashland beer parlor, pool hall and tavern operators voluntarily have agreed to cease selling beer in Ashland at 11 p. m., two hours earlier than the legal closing time of 1 a. m.

Meeting Friday with Charles P. Talent, chief of police, the operators expressed their opinion it would "be better for

all concerned" if they refused to sell beer after 11 p. m. Chief Talent had suggested they close up at midnight. The new closing time, which went into effect Friday night, affects civilians as well as soldiers, and will last indefinitely, Chief Talent said.

Meanwhile, two privates stationed at Camp White, Alfred M. Ballard and James R. Cook, were being held in the county jail on charges of assault and battery involving the alleged beating they gave Robert M. Foster, 31-year-old Ashland resident, about 1:15 a. m. Friday.

Foster suffered a severe brain injury in the scuffle and was reported yesterday as being in a semi-conscious condition in an Ashland hospital. His attending physician said he would probably recover.
