Yreka To Invade
Medford With New
Coach, Two Vets

Like Medford's Black Tornado, the Yreka, (Calif.) Miners will next Friday night be playing their first grid game under a new coach and, also like the Tigers, they will send onto the local turf an eleven far from top heavy with veteran performers.

In those two respects, at least, the contending clubs are even-steps as they prepare for the 1942 pigskin inaugural under the candles of the Tornado stadium.

George Curtis, sports editor of a Yreka paper, informs us by telephone that Yreka will invade Medford with an outfit mentored by Charles Sharpe and with but two regulars on hand from the 1941 team that captured the Siskiyou county championship.

Medford, as is already known, has a brand new head tutor in Lorne Arnold, late of Yankton college in South Dakota, and only Guard Clayton Anderson returning from last year's first string.

The Miners, according to Scribe Curtis, have been constructed around a couple of regular backs in 1941; namely, Bill Slingsby, left half, and Bruce Thompson, quarterback with the ball-toting array being rounded out by Ed Axtell, right half and George Bobish, fullback.

In the forward wall, three of last year's first line reserves are back. They are Bob Giovanetti and Carter Peters, guards and Charlie Guenther, end. Ed Savero, a rookie, holds down the other wing post; Gene Wetzel is stationed at center and Ed Allen and Bud Manley are manning the tackles. Allen is a 210-pounder and Manley a 185-pounder, informs Curtis.

That's about all the information forthcoming thus far from the California village, concerning its football lads, and not a great deal more is known about the Tornado, which spent last week at Lake O' Woods getting in condition. Coach Arnold will send his squad through nightly drills starting this evening and is expected to have additional talent in uniform, boys who because of jobs didn't attend the lake training camp.

Of those who did, the following appeared to be the first in line at their respective positions: Jack Baker, quarter; Steve Dippel, left half; Pete Orr, right half; Bill Bayliss, fullback; Darrell Monteith, left end; Ruch, left tackle; Corcoran, left guard; Ray Casebeer, center; Robinson, right guard; Flesher, right tackle and Bob Young, right end.

Baker, Dippel and Orr were reserves in 1941, seeing quite a bit of action. Bayliss last season was the number two center, but has been shifted to fullback. Of the linemen, Young, Casebeer and Monteith were 1941 reserves.

Dick Strite writes in the Register-Guard: "Don't be surprised if the Oregon High School Activities (used to be Athletics) association cuts the state basketball tournament entry to eight class A teams instead of the customary 16, but the present board is certain to retain all the sports activity possible."

Commenting on three recent changes that have been made on the board, all the newcomers being strong for competitive athletic programs, Strite further writes: "Lynn Parr of Marshfield has been replaced by Leonard B. Mayfield of Medford, a most ardent sports follower and one of the strongest talkers for a state high school football championship."

The school is again headed by Floyd V. Barrett, superintendent. An entire new faculty will appear in the high school. Miss Mabel Scheel, a graduate of Northwest Nazarene college, will teach English and chorus; Mrs. Barbara Frisbie, from the University of Nebraska, will teach science and home economics; and Mrs. Delila S. 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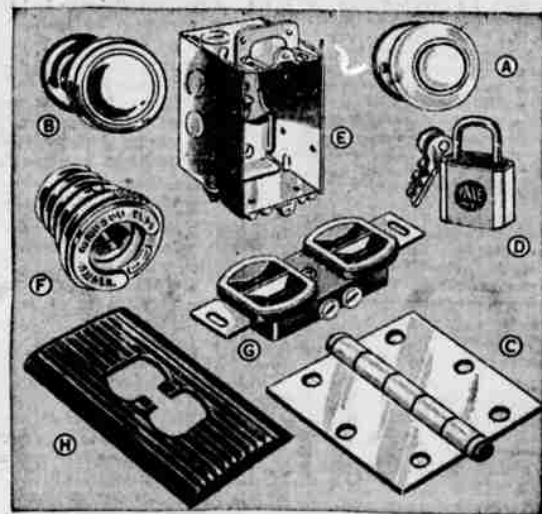
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
