

G. O. P. IN MAINE SWEEPS ELECTION BY WIDE MARGINS

(By United Press)

Five states selected candidates in primary elections today as Republicans claimed a clean sweep in Maine, the first state to hold a general election since the war started.

Wisconsin, Michigan, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and New Jersey chose candidates for senatorial, congressional and state posts while Democrats in Connecticut held their state nominating convention. Connecticut Republicans picked candidates yesterday.

In Maine, Republican candidates for the four major offices at stake led Democratic opponents by ratios ranging from two to one to nearly four to one. Several normal Democratic communities swung into the Republican column.

Sen. Wallace H. White, Jr., R., was re-elected for his third six-year term over Democrat Fulton J. Redman, former political columnist. Gov. Sumner Sewall led his Democratic rival George Washington Lane, Jr., by more than a two to one margin to win his second term.

In the Maine congressional races, former Gov. Louis J. Brann, D., was defeated decisively in the first district by former State House Speaker Robert Hale, R., who wrote a magazine article in 1936 entitled, "I, too, hate Roosevelt." In the second district, Rep. Margaret Chase Smith, R., was winner over Bradford C. Redonnet, D., Wiscasset lawyer making his political debut.

RIOTS CONTINUE IN RURAL INDIA

Bombay, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Disturbances which swept India after the arrest of Mohandas K. Gandhi and other leaders of the all-Indian congress party Aug. 9, have not been quelled in outlying rural districts, reports reaching Bombay indicated today.

Even the most conservative unofficial estimates placed the damage thus far done by rioters at several million dollars, and pointed out that the disruption of communications had retarded defense work in some areas.

Arrest of almost every recognized congress leader, and of many thousands seized from rioting mobs throughout the country, resulted in complete suppression of disorders in many districts.

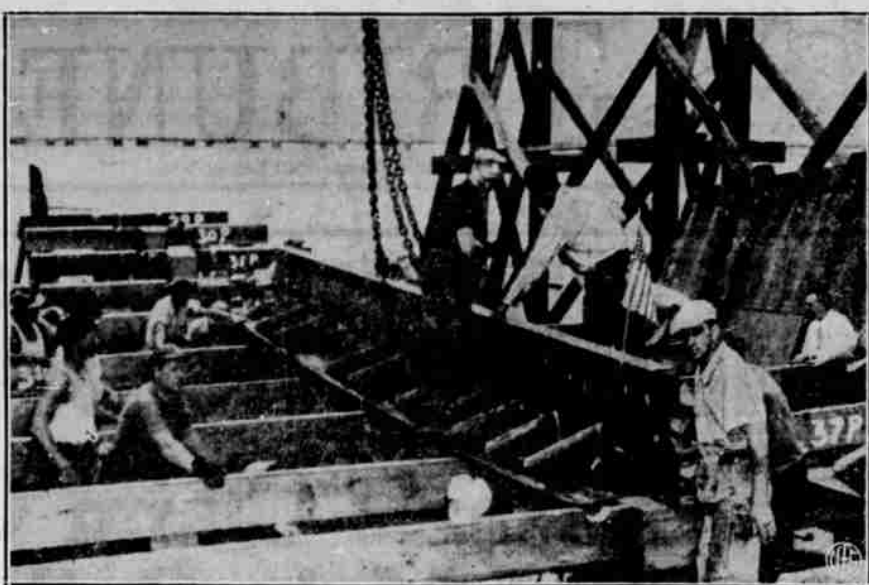

HONEY MAID GRAHAM CRACKER TORTE

Crust:

 1/3 cup butter
 2 tablespoons sugar
 Finely crush Graham Crackers and mix with butter and sugar. Press two-thirds of crumbs firmly against sides and bottom of a well-buttered spring-form torte tin.

Filling:
 3 cups milk
 4/5 cup sugar
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 2 egg yolks
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 cup crushed pineapple
 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
 6 tablespoons sugar

Bring milk to scalding point in double boiler. Blend thoroughly sugar, salt and cornstarch. Beat in egg yolks, add hot milk gradually. Return to double boiler, stir until thick. Cool. Add vanilla and pour into crumb-lined tin. Put drained pineapple on top custard. Beat egg whites stiff, add gradually 6 tablespoons sugar, spread on pineapple, sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) Chill overnight before removing from pan.

Jamaica Fortified By American Force Aids War On Subs

With the American Forces in Jamaica, Sept. 12.—(Delayed)—(U.P.)—In 18 months, American armed forces have thrown up a modern, fully-equipped barrier of defenses here and planted Main street's imprint on this once-sleepy, tropical British crown colony.

With Col. Earl Cranston Ewert, American army commander here, at the wheel of a jeep, I was taken on a lengthy tour of Jamaica's defense works—the first correspondent to inspect the base since it was completed at the end of August.

This base, already playing an important part in the war against enemy submarines operating in the Caribbean, is ready for any tricks the axis may try.
