

# Cards Take Two-Game Lead With 14-Inning, 3-2 Win Over Phils

## BROWN'S SINGLE TALLIES PITCHER WITH MARGIN RUN

Tense Leaders Find Phils Difficult—Murry Dickson Star—Dodgers Idle.

New York, Sept. 16.—(U.P.)—Although the recent series between the Cards and the Dodgers served to emphasize the qualities of the Redbirds as potential champions, the Cards, in the three days since they took the lead from Brooklyn, have given the fans cause to wonder.

The difficulty the Cards have had in their meetings with the lowly Philadelphia Phils has made the league-leaders look bad. They took three games out of four from the Phils, but two of them were decided by a single run, one in the ninth inning and the other in the 14th.

Apparently, tension and a natural letdown after the exciting brush with the Dodgers is responsible. Since early in August, the Cards have waged a game, uphill battle. But they were always doing the shooting and never had to look behind.

Now, since their overnight surge into a two-game grip on the top spot after a drive that has accumulated 32 victories in 38 starts, the resulting tension is wholly understandable.

St. Louis came through like champions with a tight, 14-inning 3-2 triumph over the Phils yesterday to boost their margin to two games over the Dodgers, idle for the second day.

**Starts Rally**  
Murry Dickson was the game's individual star. Replacing Mort Cooper with none out in the ninth, Dickson allowed only three hits over the remainder of the game for his seventh victory. He began the winning rally in the 14th with a two-out double and carried the winning run across when Jimmy Brown singled.

## TRAVEL SITUATION SERIOUS PROBLEM IF CARDINALS WIN

Chicago, Sept. 16.—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Cardinals, a head-ache to National League rivals for the past five weeks, presented baseball's top executives today with a serious problem for the 1942 World series.

From early May until a week ago the Brooklyn Dodgers looked like a cinch to win the National league pennant and meet the New York Yankees in the series. With apparently another "subway series" assured war-time restrictions on travel didn't worry diamond officials. Then along came the Cardinals and upset the "dream arrangements."

A "how-to-get-everybody-there-in-time" problem faced Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis and his aides after a meeting yesterday settled the routine series arrangements.

The fall diamond classic will open September 30 in the park of the National league winner with the second game there October 1. If the Cardinals are the senior circuit representative there'll be a day allotted for travel between the second and third games and the fifth and sixth contests, if the series goes that far.

Should the Dodgers rally to take the pennant, the first six games, if that many are required, will be played on consecutive days at Ebbett's field and Yankee stadium.

In former years special trains were chartered for the players, club officials and writers to insure uninterrupted movement between the competing cities. However, "specials" have been ruled out by Defense Transportation Director Joseph B. Eastman.

The uncertainties of travel bookings account for the decision to open the series September 30. With the regular league schedules ending Sunday, September 27, the series normally would open the following Tuesday. However, the inaugural game was set back one day as a "safety first" measure.

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## Pugilism's "Ugly Duckling" Falls In Mike Jacobs' Lap

Hempstead, N. J., Sept. 16.—(U.P.)—The war has tossed the "ugly duckling" of pugilism into Mike Jacobs' lap. Sgt. Jackie Wilson of California is in the East, at last, doing his stuff daily at Mitchell Field.

Jackie Wilson, the thin-shanked Negro from Los Angeles who claims that he can knock out any welterweight in the world, has filtered through the embargo on his explosive fists, using the uniform as a passport. And he is ready for competition with any of the carefully nurtured big-game welterweights of the East—Ray Robinson, Fritz Zivic, Marty Servo, Freddie Archer, etc.

Hence the somewhat frantic negotiations of Jacobs' 20th Century club to find a "policeman"—a tough welterweight slugger—who may belt Wilson back to his Mitchell Field barracks. Jacobs has assured Wilson's manager, Walt Melrose, that Wilson will fight on the Louis-Connard at Yankee stadium, October 12.

Matchmaker Nat Rodgers of the 20th Century has free rein in selecting an opponent for a fighter who never before has appeared in the East. But the managers of top-flight welters are shunning him as if he had smallpox.

Jackie Wilson (not to be confused with the featherweight title claimant, Jackie Wilson of Pittsburgh) would have come East long ago were it not for the virtual embargo on his fists. He's a Negro welterweight, and an exceptionally good one, with 37 knockouts in 51 pro bouts. But the 20th Century had one great Negro welterweight in Henry Armstrong and then another in young Ray Robinson. Therefore, 20th Century apparently figured it wasn't good business to have another great Negro welter at the same time as either Armstrong or Robinson. So Jackie Wilson stayed in California until his uniform brought him to Mitchell Field, raring to go.
