

Tornado Faces Yreka Friday With 9 Lettermen in Starting Line-up

FOOTBALL OPENER SLATED FOR 8:15 AT LOCAL FIELD

Team Improves Past Two Nights, Coach Arnold Says—Yreka Power Unknown.

With two strenuous weeks of drilling behind them, Medford high's Black Tornado gridders will open their 1942 season here tomorrow night against the Yreka, (Calif.) Miners with nine lettermen in their starting line-up. New Coach Lorne Arnold said today. A light, limbering-up workout is scheduled for 7:30 tonight.

Arnold, sending his first Medford team into action against a foe whose strength is unknown, said that Jack Baker would open at quarterback, Steve Dippel, state 100-yard dash champion, at left half; Pete Orr at right half and Bill Bayliss, despite a bruised heel, at fullback. All are lettermen.

The forward wall, according to the mentor, will find Darrell Monteith and Bob Young at the ends, Ruch and Lowell Fleser at the tackles, Clayton Anderson and Bob Davis at the guards and Ray Casebeer at center. All but Fleser and Ruch are lettermen.

Arnold said that Dale Niedermeyer would undoubtedly see action at fullback, Hal Adams at either or both left and right half and Bob Davis at quarterback. Jack Young, letterman halfback who reported for practice this week, may also get into the fray, the coach said.

Other players tentatively slated for service during the contest are Jim Miller, center; Robinson, Corcoran and Vincent, guards; Vogel and Sheldon, tackles; Tunny, Plaskett and Doty, ends and Cox, fullback.

"Ready as Possible" Although the team still needs lots of work, considerable improvement has been noted the last two practice sessions with players taking care of their assignments rather nicely, Arnold disclosed. "We are as ready as possible," he said.

A scrimmage was held last night, with Monteith's pass-catching, Dippel's speed and Bayliss' blocking making good impressions on Arnold. Adams and Bayliss are taking care of the punting duties, with Bayliss, Dippel, Orr and Adams the aerial staff.

Officials for the game will be George Harrington, Jean Eberhart and Glenn Swanson. The game will start at 8:15, and Principal Leonard Mayfield said there were a few reserved seats and season reserved still available. The advance sale of reserved seats is the best in years, the principal stated.

Obstacle Race Toughen Men At Mitchel Field Air Base

(By Jack Cuddy United Press Staff Correspondent) Hempstead, N. Y., Sept. 17.—(U.P.)—The war has changed our philosophy of living in many respects, and for those who have been privileged to visit some of our great military encampments, it has changed our conception of "big-time" sports.

Here at Mitchel field—one of the world's great air bases—sports are being carried on with a magnitude and an intensity that we never have noted in major league training camp, college campus or city park.

And the man responsible for this all-out sports program at Mitchel field symbolizes the pace and the magnitude of its sports program. We refer to Major Lou J. Tschudi, one of the most popular officers on the post.

You can't quite appreciate Maj. Tschudi's elation unless you have been at this great base and seen the thousands and thousands of men who are training here. And he's the one man responsible for their physical fitness and their "toughness" when they leave for points unknown.

We asked Maj. Tschudi, "What goes on here? Can you tell us how you harden these legions of men? Is there any particular sport that you accentuate?"

Maj. Tschudi, director of athletics and entertainment, replied, "I don't know what you have read in the papers about how service men in other branches are prepared for combat. But I'll tell you this. We concentrate on obstacle races. When our men leave here, they are able to run—f-o-r-w-a-r-d—with speed and stamina, and able to jump over or climb over almost anything that may be placed in their path.

"This obstacle racing is compulsory for every man who comes into camp—whether he be a pilot or merely a field-maintenance man. There are other compulsory exercises, but

ANTELOPE SEASON TO OPEN SEPT. 23

Oregon's fifth successive open season for antelope opens September 23 and will extend to and include September 30. Bag limit is one antelope of either sex, and hunting will be permitted in specified portions of Lake, Malheur and Harney counties.

The number of antelope tags to be issued is limited to 1,500 and while there still are some available, it is anticipated that most of them, if not all, will be sold by the opening of the season. Anyone desiring to apply for a tag should mail to the game commission office in Portland the fee of \$3.50 if a resident, or \$5 if a nonresident, together with information as to the number and kind of hunting license owned.

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DODGERS BATTLE AGAIN; TROUNCE BUCS BY 10 TO 3

Camilli Belts Two Homers, Two Singles—Cards Win To Keep Two-Game Lead.

By Oscar Fraley United Press Correspondent. New York, Sept. 17.—(U.P.)—The Brooklyn Dodgers were their old battling, brawling selves today as they went against the dazed Pittsburgh Pirates—praying that the pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals would make just one slip.

"Just let them make one little bobble and they'll find out who's going to win that pennant," Manager Leo Durocher chortled yesterday when his Brooks snapped their five-game losing streak with one of the most murderous attacks ever seen at Ebbets Field.

It was a different Brooklyn ball club than the listless team that dropped five straight to give the Cards the National league lead. After a two-day layoff the team came up swinging from the floor and landed six Pirate pitchers for 19 hits and a 10-3 victory.

But St. Louis held the pace—and the two-game lead—by topping the Boston Braves, 6-2, for its 33rd victory in its last 39 starts.

Big Dolph Camilli, the thumping first baseman named the league's most valuable player last year, led the Brooks out of their hitting slump with four for five, including his 23rd and 24th homers of the year, and knocked in five runs. Dixie Walker had four for four and Pete Reiser made three safeties. Whit Wyatt was only as good as he had to be, yielding 10 hits for his 18th victory of the year.

Brawl In Boxes A pre-game box seat brawl, which could have happened only in Brooklyn, touched off the fireworks. Three spectators battled with and routed ushers and then, unwisely, heckled Mickey Owen and Walker. The two players went into the stands and won a handy decision before police carried off the trio.

Chicago split with the Phils to replace the Pirates in fifth place. The Cubs dropped the first, 3-1, but took the second, 4-1. Paul Derringer topped Bill Lohrman in a tight duel as the Reds stopped the Giants, 3-1. The Yankees, with the American league flag nailed up at the stadium, rolled along with a 5-1 win over Detroit as Marv Breuer gave the Tigers only two hits.

Jim Bagby allowed only five hits as the Cleveland Indians ended a six-game losing streak by beating Washington, 5-1. Boston Blanked The St. Louis Browns shut out the Boston Red Sox, 3-0.
