Raised by contributions from
camps and members throughout
the United States, the All American
fund of Royal Neighbors of
America of \$21,163.05 has been
contributed to the blood plasma
program of the Red Cross, ac-
cording to a report from the su-
preme office of the fraternal
benefit society received by Mrs.
Irene Shirley, recorder of Camp
No. 4713 of Medford.
F. A. Winfrey, manager of the
midwestern area of the Red
Cross at St. Louis, Mo., in a let-
ter to the society stated: "It is
with a great deal of pleasure
that we acknowledge the very
generous expression of your in-
terest in the American Red Cross
blood plasma program. The
check has been allotted to this
service and will extend its neigh-
borliness and help to our wound-
ed soldiers and sailors and avi-
ators wherever the American
flag flies today. This amount
will provide life-saving plasma
for some seven thousand trans-
fusions somewhere on the far-
flung battle fields of the world."
