TORNADO, YREKA
OPEN 1942 GRID
SEASON TONIGHT

Coach Arnold Says Locals
in Good Shape For Fray—
Game to Start at 8:15.

Before what is expected to be the largest opening-game crowd in many years, Medford high's Black Tornado launches its nine-game grid schedule against the Yreka, (Calif.) Miners at the stadium tonight. The kickoff is slated for 8:15 sharp.

Playing their first game under new coach Lorne Arnold, the red and black pikemakers will move against the invaders with only one 1941 regular in their lineup. Clayton Anderson, left guard but with eight other letterman manning positions they won during the past two weeks of practice.

Arnold sent the squad through a light signal drill last night and reported today that, as a whole, it was in "pretty good physical condition." Bill Bayliss, fullback, is bothered by a bruised heel and Lowell Flesher, right tackle, has a bruised shoulder. Otherwise, the lads are "in the pink."

In last night's final workout, the club brushed up on pass defense, went through kickoff maneuvers, drilled lightly on throwing up a stronger defense for the punter and checked over all its Notre Dame system of offensive plays. In the afternoon Arnold and his quarterbacks had a session on strategy.

1941 Champs
Yreka, also playing its first game of the season, will come here an unknown quantity. The Miners, like the locals, are under a new coach, Charles Sharpe, and have two regulars returning from the 1941 eleven that captured the Siskiyou county championship. They are Bill Slingsby, who will probably carry most of the offensive burden at his left-halfback position, and Bruce Thompson, quarterback.

Left half Steve Dippel, state 100-yard dash champion and Bayliss, the converted center, will undoubtedly provide most of the Tornado's attacking fire. Tentative lineups:

WRIGHT DEFENDS
FEATHER DIADEM

New York, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—When Chalky Wright of Los Angeles climbs into Madison Square Garden's ring on Sept. 25 to defend his 126 pound featherweight crown against Lulu Costantino, it will be the first time Promoter Mike Jacobs staged such a bout since Henry Armstrong wrestled the title from Pete Saran at the Garden, October 29, 1937.

Yet ballyhoo for the heavyweight title clash between Joe Louis and Billy Conn has virtually blacked out this bout.

Not since the Armstrong era has the 126-pound division boasted a champion and contender of sufficient class to merit a Garden main event—not until Wright and Costantino came along. Jacobs now believes, however, that this brawl will usher in a brilliant series of feather bouts since the class has more talent now than any other division.

CARDINALS TAKE
THREE-GAME LEAD
IN FLAG BATTLE

Redbirds Belt Boston, 6-4
as Brooks Bow to Pirates
3-2—Yanks Win 100.

New York, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—The promised land was only seven games away for the St. Louis Cardinals today but the magic numeral also signaled the end of the National league pennant trail for the flock from Flatbush.

Three full games separate the leading Cardinals from the runner-up Brooklyn Dodgers and any combination of lucky "7." St. Louis triumphs or Brooklyn defeats—would put the senior league bunting atop Sportsman's park for the first time since 1934 when the Redbirds won the world championship from the Detroit Tigers.

Even if the Cardinals, who now have won five in a row and 34 out of their last 40, were only to break even in their remaining eight games, the Dodgers would have to win eight of their last 10 contests to gain a tie.

The Cardinals, with some valuable help from the Pittsburgh Pirates, practically buried the Dodgers' remaining hopes yesterday by scoring a ninth-inning, 6-4, triumph over the Braves at Boston while Brooklyn bowed, 3-2 to the Pittsburghers at Ebbets field.

Five In Ninth
Al Javery's effective pitching checked the Cards for eight innings but they rallied like true champions for five runs in the ninth to pull the game out of the fire. The Cards might have been retired with the score tied at 3-all but for an error by Sibby Sisti whose wild throw to Max West after handling Harry Walker's roller put St. Louis in front.

Walker Cooper opened the rally by beating out a bunt, Javery then walked Johnny Hopp and George Kuroski forced Cooper at third. Pinch-hitter Ray Sanders singled to score Hopp. Ken O'Dea pinch-batted a squeeze bunt which scored Kuroski. Ernie Dusk ran for Sanders and Ernie White for O'Dea. Jimmy Brown then forced White. Pinch-runner Dusk came home on Sisti's error. Enos Slaughter singled Brown across and pinch-hitter Coaker Triplett's single counted Walker.

The Braves rallied for one run in their half but with two on and none out, Harry Gumbert took the mound and forced Chet Ross to fly out. After Nanny Fernandez singled, Ernie Lombardi hit into a fast double play.

Rip Sewell held Brooklyn to eight hits. He was in trouble only once, in the fourth when the Dodgers scored both their runs. Pee Wee Reese knocked in one run with a single and Dixie Walker sent the other over with a double.

The Bucs scored all their runs in the first two innings off Ed Head but Max Macon stopped them with two hits the rest of the way. Bob Elliott's pop fly, which fell right on the foul line, gave the Bucs their first-inning run. Al Lopez' single, Sewell's double and a hit by Pete Coscarart got the eventual game-winners in the second. The victory broke an eight-game losing spell for Pittsburgh.

Babe Young and Johnny Mize drove in all the runs as the New York Giants tripped the Cincinnati Reds, 11-1.

Rookie Henry Wyse, up from Tulsa, pitched his second straight win as the Chicago Cubs topped the Philadelphia Phils, 8-0.

Atley Donald won his 10th

game as the New York Yankees registered their 100th victory in downing the Detroit Tigers, 7-4. The Yankees clinched the game in the fifth with four runs on four hits, three coming on Joe DiMaggio's 20th homer. It was the eighth time in the club's history that a Yankee team had won 100 or more games a season. Tex Hughson won his 20th victory as the Red Sox, paced by Tex Williams beat the Browns, 5-1.

The Philadelphia A's scored a brilliant, 1-0 win over the Chicago White Sox.

Sid Hudson walked Pinch-hitter Buster Mills with the bases filled in the 11th to force in the run that gave the Cleveland Indians a 6-5 victory over the Washington Senators.
