

Fourth Quarter Drive Gives Black Tornado 13-0 Win Over Yreka

BAYLISS, DIPPEL REACH PAY DIRT WITH LONG RUNS

Three-Quarters of Ragged Play Has Fast Finish—Visitors Punt Well.

Held scoreless for three quarters of a rather ragged gridiron struggle that inaugurated the 1942 season, Medford high's Black Tornado created two perfect touchdowns in the final period to turn back the invading Yreka (Calif.) Miners, 13 to 0, Friday night and launch in victorious fashion the local coaching career of Lorne S. Arnold.

Performing before an estimated 3,000 spectators, the Tornado shook off its earlier uncertainty and raggedness to break full-back Bill Bayliss and Left Half-back Steve Dippel into the open for long scoring sorties that turned a nip-and-tuck battle into a decisive Medford conquest.

The first Tiger touchdown came on the second play of the fourth quarter. With the ball on Yreka's 28-yard line, third and nine, Bayliss broke over his own right guard on a beautifully-executed T-formation play and went the distance, aided by a couple of key blocks on the secondary. Hal Adams' placekick for the extra point was wide.

Three minutes before the game was over the Tornado had its other touchdown, with Dippel, state 100-yard dash champion, finally getting a chance to show his flaming speed. On a sweep around his own right end Dippel suddenly cut in, let his interference take care of the defensive fullback, outran the defensive left halfback and straight-armed his way past the safety man to complete a 41-yard scoring journey. This time Adams' placekick was true for a 13 to 0 score.

Adams, who alternated at left and right halfback throughout the game, set up the Bayliss touchdown with a 30-yard punt return that placed the leather on Yreka's 29-yard stripe, just as the third quarter ended.

The Tigers recovered a Yreka fumble to set the stage for Dippel's dash into pay dirt. Bayliss, immediately afterwards, cracked Yreka's left tackle for 20 yards, and then followed Dippel's 41-yard thriller to wrap up the contest.

Although the ball was in Medford territory most of the first half, the Miners made only one serious scoring threat, and that was halted on the 13-yard line. Bill Slingsby, Yreka left halfback, returned a Bayliss punt 45 yards on a twisting, turning

run, placing the ball on the Medford 21 at the close of the first quarter, but the locals threw up a stiff defense and took the ball on downs on their own 13 and Adams kicked 49 yards out of danger.

Medford dominated play in the second half, keeping Yreka deep in its own territory in the third quarter and finally applied the scoring heat in the final 12 minutes.

Although showing the customary signs of first-game nervousness and raggedness, the Tigers were impressive defensively throughout and, on those two touchdown plays, displayed promise of future offensive prowess.

Statistically, Medford had the edge in everything but punting. The Tigers rolled up 196 yards on the ground to 76 for Yreka and made five first downs to four. The Miners had the better punting average, 36.5 yards to 34.8 for the locals. Only one completion in eight attempts showed the Tornado's passing attack to be in need of improvement.

Next game for the Tornado is at Marshfield Friday afternoon, after which the club will open its Southern Oregon conference season against Grants Pass here the night of October 2.

TEX OLIVER TEAM SWAMPS PACIFIC; BOB KOCH STARS

Stockton, Cal., Sept. 19.—(U.P.) The powerful St. Mary's college Navy pre-flight football team overwhelmed College of Pacific, 38 to 9, before 7,000 fans here today.

Captain Tex Oliver used about 35 men, all former college stars, to score almost at will. The Navy team made a touchdown in the first quarter, two in the second, another in the third and three in the fourth.

College of Pacific made its only score of the game after 10 minutes of the first quarter, when Quarterback Camilla passed 26 yards to Clare Slaught, end, in the end zone. Falschi, former Santa Clara university quarterback, passed 25 yards to Jim Newquist, Oregon, left half, a few minutes later for the first Navy touchdown.

Early in the second, Gleason of Fresno State crashed over tackle for the Navy's second touchdown.

A bad pass from center went over Gleason's head a few minutes later, and he dashed back 25 yards to fall on the ball behind his own goal for a safety, giving College of Pacific two points. The half ended with the score 13 to 9.

Newquist tossed the ball 30 yards into the end zone early in the third, where it was snatched by Gentry, Washington State all-American for the fourth Navy touchdown.

A freak fumble early in the fourth gave the visitors their fifth tally.

Long runs by Bob Koch of Oregon, who traveled 27, 12, nine and five yards in successive plays, set up the Navy's next score.

BROOKLYN CLIPS IDLE CARDS LEAD; CONQUERS PHILS

Casey Rescues Curt Davis in Overtime Game—Reds Victors.

The Brooklyn Dodgers kept their National league pennant hopes alive Saturday by shading the Phils, 5-4, in 11 innings at Ebbetts field to trim the idle Cardinals' league lead to 2½ games. The St. Louis-Chicago game was postponed.

The Dodgers won the game when St. Johnson, third Philadelphia pitcher, walked four men in a row to force home the deciding run, Pee Wee Reese scoring the important tally.

Philadelphia clipped Curt Davis and Hugh Casey for 14 hits but missed several opportunities to win the game. A great throw by Pete Reiser cut down Nick Etten at the plate to save Davis in the 10th while Casey pitched his way out of a bases-filled jam in the 11th.

A grand-slam homer by Manager Mel Ott, his 28th of the year, enabled the Giants to defeat the Braves, 7-6 at Boston. The score was tied 3-3 in the seventh when Ott propelled his round-tripper over the right field screen. The Braves secured their runs in two three-run bursts, garnering the first trio off Carl Hubbell in the opening round and three more in the eighth off Bill McGee and Ace Adams who made his 59th relief appearance. Hubbell won his 10th triumph although lifted for a pinch-hitter in the seventh.

Bucky Walters turned in his 15th victory as the Reds downed the Pirates, 4-3 for the second straight time at Pittsburgh. Rookie Bill Brandt was tapped for eight hits but a homer by Bert Haas with one on in the fourth, was the most damaging. Rookie Frank Colman hit his first major league homer for the Bucs in the third, an inside-the-park blow. Gerald Walker garnered three hits for the Reds.

ALSAB NOSES OUT GREAT WHIRLAWAY IN SPECIAL RACE

Telephoto Gives Decision in Hectic Finish—Betting Very Light.

Pawtucket, R. I., Sept. 19.—(U.P.) Whirlaway, one of the greatest stretch runners in turf history, didn't have quite enough in the run for home today and the top money winner of all time lost a \$25,000 special match race to Alsab, king of racing's bargain basement.

The unpredictable three-year-old which Al Sabath of Chicago purchased for \$700 at a Saratoga yearling sale, led almost all the way to win a nose decision on a photo finish which kept an estimated crowd of \$5,000 at Narragansett park on edge for three minutes.

The race was so close that the photo had to be studied longer than usual by the judges before they gave the nod to the leading money winner among the three-year-olds.

Under a perfect ride by Carroll Berman, Alsab went out in front at the start of the mile and three-sixteenths dream race and was never worse than even in the greatest match turf contest since Seabiscuit defeated War Admiral at Pimlico in 1938.

George Woolf, who rode the Biscuit that day, was up on Whirlaway and as usual he gave the long-tailed chestnut his head at the top of the stretch but the horse's champion was not quite good enough.

Turning for home, he had Whirlaway on the outside, a length behind Alsab. Whirlaway was coming up and might have won in another stride. For a time it appeared the race would be declared a no contest for Narragansett park officials had announced that would be done if it ended in a dead heat.

But the judges decided there was margin enough to declare Alsab the winner. It couldn't have been closer.

As a match it couldn't have been better, but as a wagering proposition it was a flop. Only \$35,142 was bet on the race with the Army and Navy Relief Funds netting less than \$3,000. The track previously had contributed \$150,000 to the agencies, however.

The Yanks came from behind to tie the score on Charley Keller's 26th homer in the seventh, but Bill Dickey's wild throw let in two runs for the Red Sox and Lou Finney's single sent in another to win the game. Homers by Ted Williams, his 34th, and Finney, gave the Sox an early lead which the Yanks tied in the third. Spud Chandler opened the Yanks' rallying rally in the seventh with a hit and Phil Rizuto beat out his third safety. Roy Cullenbine's homer scored three runs and Keller tied it up with his circuit smash.

Washington walloped the A's, 8-3 and 11-9 at Philadelphia. Scoring three runs in the fourth inning, the Senators tucked away the opener with a similar cluster in the sixth. Early Wynn, opposed by three rookie moundsmen, held the A's to nine hits while Bobby Estelle drove in three of Washington's runs and scored two.

The Senators belted three pitchers for 17 hits in the nightcap, scoring five in the second and sewing up the game with three in the eighth and one in the ninth. The A's collected 10 hits off a trio of pitchers.
