CARD BOSS SAYS YANKS NO CINCH TO GRAB SERIES

Chicago, Sept. 19.—(U.P.)—Billy Southworth, the bantam manager of the pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals, today scoffed at the old theory that hectic National league pennant races make the circuit's entry a "soft touch" for the American league victor in the World series.

The American league champions have copped seven of the last 10 World series and many diamond observers have attributed that margin of superiority to the fact the junior loop always sends a well-rested representative into the play-off while the National league teams have been "worn down" by their traditionally torrid stretch battles.

Southworth won't go along on that reasoning. "Don't get the idea that I do not think it's a fine thing for a team to win a pennant when there's still a couple weeks of the season left," he said, "that gives a manager a chance to rest his key players and then bring them back pepped up and ready for the big test. On the other hand the simple fact that you've had a tough race in your own league doesn't mean that a club can't have any punch and spark left to carry with it into the series."

GRANT OUTPLAYS PELICANS—LOSES; MARSHFIELD WINS

Klamath Falls opened its 1942 football season Friday night by scoring a 15 to 0 victory over Grant high of Portland at Klamath Falls, and Marshfield, next opponent of Medford's Black Tornado, defeated Washington high of Portland, 7 to 0 Friday afternoon at Marshfield.

Grant outplayed the Pelicans until Dick Vaillancour intercepted a pass in the second quarter and raced 80 yards for a touchdown. Yancey, later, grabbed a blocked punt and ran five yards to score, and a Klamath safety completed the scoring.

In another game, Bend's Lava Bears defeated Burns, 30 to 14.

NOTED MAGAZINE PUBLISHER DEAD

New York, Sept. 19.—(U.P.)—Conde Nast, 68, president of the Conde Nast publications and one of the nation's leading magazine publishers, died at his home today of a heart attack.

Nast was the publisher of "Vogue," "House and Garden," and other magazines. Born in New York, he was educated to be a lawyer, but became attracted to the publishing business shortly after leaving college. He became advertising manager of the Collier publications at \$50,000 a year, but gave up that position to found his own press.

He acquired "Vogue" and in 14 years built it into one of the world's leading fashion magazines. Then he employed Frank Crowninshield to edit a new magazine, "Vanity Fair," which portrayed the life of cafe society and the international set during the 1920's.

NAME ILLINOISAN HEAD OF "40 ET 8"

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 19.—(U.P.)—Elbert H. Burns of Champaign, Ill., was elected chief de Chemin de Fer of the Forty and Eight, the national fun and honor society of the American Legion at the annual convention here today.

Burns succeeds Dr. L. J. Kisminsky of Arkansas. He was formerly a Sous Chef de Chemin de Fer.

Activities of the Forty and Eight, usually colorful, were confined to sober business this year because of the war. Meetings were confined entirely to committee reports and making plans for next year.

WISCONSIN WINS
Madison, Wis., Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—The University of Wisconsin football team took advantage of only one of several scoring opportunities today but scored a 7-0 victory over a beefy defensive army eleven from Camp Grant, Ill.

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HITLER GAINS IN RUSSIA NET HIM NO WAR MATERIAL

London, Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—Adolf Hitler's reckless investment of blood and materials to win control of Russia's treasures has netted him virtually no dividends, responsible British economic experts said tonight.

Nazi armies, facing a second winter on the eastern front, have conquered a territory greater than the combined areas of Texas, California and New Mexico, but have paid a terrible price and, according to economic experts, the best they have to show for it are not positive gains, but the advantages of having deprived Russia of vital war materials.

Hitler has overrun one third of Russia's wheat producing regions and other large agricultural areas. But German food rations continue on a bed rock level.

Hitler controls one half of Russia's coal, iron and steel producing territories. But Germany's armaments industry has received little or nothing from these sources.

Hitler has captured one twentieth of Russia's oil producing centers. Not one drop has gone to Germany.

Economic experts cited the Soviet scorched earth policy, an acute labor shortage and inadequate transportation facilities as main reasons why Hitler has not been able to exploit his eastern conquests.

He may obtain enough wheat from the Ukraine this year to feed about one fourth of his eastern armies, if Russians themselves are left virtually to starve, experts said. But no wheat will reach the German home front before at least another 12 months.

In peacetime the conquered Russia territory produced about 35,000,000 tons of cereal crops annually, including 11,000,000 tons of wheat. Last year, due to ravages of war, the scorched earth policy and removal by Russians of all skilled labor and agricultural machinery, the crops yielded only 30 to 40 per cent of normal. British expected a further decline.

NORWAY PATRIOT PULLS FAST ONE

London, Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—Norwegian circles chuckled tonight over a grapevine story from their Nazi-occupied country.

The Nazis, so the story went, became apoplectic when they found that some patriot had slipped this paragraph into an otherwise innocuous article on forest plants in the German-controlled press.

"The ash weed, or German weed as it is sometimes called, belongs to the unbeliferous class. This weed is a great nuisance and, once it has taken root, it is almost impossible to get rid of it."

"But it is excellent food for pigs."

Portland, Ore., Sept. 19.—(U.P.)—The three Kaiser shipyards in the Portland area—Oregon Shipbuilding, Vancouver, and Swan Island—took full page advertisements in newspapers here tonight to appeal for 10,000 more shipyard workers.

BRITISH U-BOAT TERROR MISSING

London, Sept. 19.—(U.P.)—The admiralty today announced that the 540-ton submarine Uge is overdue and must be considered lost. The vessel normally carried a crew of 27 men and officers.

The submarine had inflicted damage on the enemy far out of proportion to its size, the admiralty said.

It sank two Italian cruisers that carried 8-inch guns and a destroyer and damaged an armed merchant cruiser, the communiqué said.

After the attack in which one of the cruisers was sunk, the communiqué said, the Uge was subjected to 64 depth-charge attacks for several hours.

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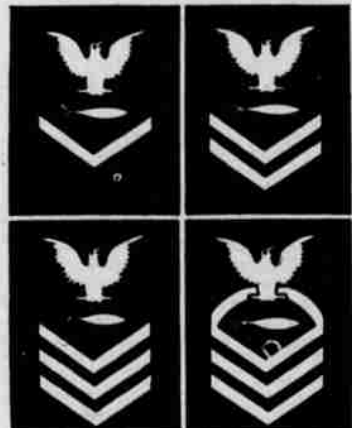
