"Health relations between Camp White and Jackson County" is the topic announced for the address of Colonel Chas. Hutter before the Jackson County Public Health association Thursday afternoon, September 24. The bi-monthly meeting of the association will open at 2 o'clock, as usual, in the county court house auditorium, Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, president, announced.

Colonel Hutter's address, however, is not scheduled until 3 o'clock and the general public is invited to come and hear him. His message, Mrs. Wells stated, will be of interest to men as well as women. Colonel Hutter has consented to speak before the association at a public gathering at the request of Dr. A. E. Merkel, Jackson county public health officer.

Colonel Hutter is chief medical officer at Camp White. Preceding the meeting the 1942 Seal Sale chairmen of the various county communities will meet for luncheon with Mrs. Leonard Mayfield, county chairman of the coming drive.

Following the program at the court house a social hour will be enjoyed with tea served by the Central Point and Gold Hill groups.

The meeting will mark opening of fall activities for the health association and Mrs. Wells is asking that members in all localities make a special effort to attend. Every interested person is also invited to meetings are not limited to those affiliated with health groups.

TRESCOTT FREED TO RETURN TO JOB

On recommendation of the grand jury, Charles R. Trescott, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, has been released on his own recognizance, to return to work in a sawmill. The grand jury investigated the case in its short session last week, without completing it.

Kermit R. Mansfield, bound over in Ashland justice court, before Justice M. R. Burns, on burglary charges with bonds set at \$10,000, is still under investigation by the grand jury. Mansfield is charged with a number of prowlings in Ashland, and is said to have been identified by two women as the man who entered their homes.

Mansfield, according to the district attorney, is wanted in California as a parole violator. Records show he served 17 months of a five year term in San Quentin prison for burglary.

18,907 SUICIDES REPORTED IN 1940

Washington, Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—Deaths by suicide in the United States numbered 18,907 in 1940 and were at the rate of 14.4 per 100,000 population, the census bureau reported today.

Suicide death rates during 40 years have ranged between 10.2 in 1900 and 17.4 in 1932 at the peak of the depression, the report stated. During 1932 suicides numbered 20,646. Except for the 1932 peak and the rate of 16.8 for 1931 they have been fairly constant through the years.

Male victims of suicide in 1940 were more than three times as great as females, the usual proportion over 40 years. The suicide rate among whites is nearly four times as great as among negroes—15.5 to 4.0 per 100,000 population. The rate among Indians is 8.4, among Chinese 45.2, and among Japanese in the U. S. 26.0.

RUBBER RECORD

Callao, Juab County, Utah, Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—This community of 54 residents today claimed a national record in the rubber salvage drive. Mrs. Clara B. Tripp, member of the community's salvage committee, reports that residents collected 4,854 pounds of rubber, an average of 90 pounds for each resident.

In the day's other two games, the Redskins humbled the Pittsburgh Steelers, 28-14, at Washington and the Cleveland Rams defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-14, at Akron, O.

He was born at Lisbon, Iowa, July 1, 1856 and is the last of a family of 12 children. At the age of 23 he was married at Lisbon to Eva Albin and to this union were born the following children: Roy Young of Avenol, Calif.; George Jr., Lisbon, Ia.; Leo Young and Iva Harper of Medford. Two children and his wife preceded him in death.

In 1878 he moved to Kansas where he took a homestead and engaged in farming and stock raising and for many years in the implement business.

In 1894 he was married at Norton, Kas., to Lulu May Wood and to this union were born four children, Paul A. Young of Santa Paula, Cal.; Embra S. of Santa Luis, Cal.; Wilma of Santa Maria and Philip T. of Medford. This wife died here in 1923. There are also left 15 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren and other relatives and many friends.

Funeral services will be held in Conger chapel at 2:30 Wednesday with the Rev. W. H. Eaton officiating. Six of the grandchildren will serve as casket bearers and interment will be in Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Washington, Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—The National Police Gazette, a regular fixture of barber shops long before they were invaded by bobbed-haired women, has been found by the post office department to be "lewd and lascivious."

The department announced last night that the magazine henceforth will be banned from the mails. It denied that the magazine in its present form was "an American tradition." The post office contends that the present publisher leased the right to use the name, "National Police Gazette," in 1935, after the previous publication known by the name "had been out of business and 'extinct' for some time."
