

LEGION FAVORS CALLING OF ALL RESOURCES, MEN

National Convention Unanimous For Universal Conscription Also For Boys.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—The American Legion yesterday adopted unanimously a strongly worded resolution calling for universal conscription of the country's resources, including the immediate drafting of 18 and 19-year-old youths.

In a report to the 24th national convention of the legion, the legislative committee said "we demand of the national administration and of congress immediate legislation for drafting or conscription of all the resources of this nation, including capital, labor, industry and agriculture, as well as the fighting manpower."

In a standing voice vote delegates unanimously adopted the resolution.

A voluminous report by the committee on national defense, headed by Warren Atherton of Stockton, Cal., was adopted unanimously.

Would Call Boys
The report called for immediate drafting into military service of all 18 and 19-year-olds, and advocated a post-war regulation that all American males be required to undergo at least one year of military training before reaching their 22nd birthdays.

In addition, the report demanded a post-war army, navy and air force "of sufficient strength" to cope with any eventuality.

Delegates also adopted a resolution calling for job security for veterans now and after the war.

Rev. Paul Mortimer of Pocatello, Ida., was named national chaplain.

No town was designated for the 1943 convention, and leaders doubted if another convention would be held until after the war. Two cities, Omaha and Pittsburgh, were offered as choices.

FARMER THWARTS KIDNAP ATTEMPT

Geneva, Ill., Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—An angry farmer, swinging a heavy potato masher, thwarted the apparent kidnaping plot of two youths who had held members of his family at gunpoint for five hours, authorities said today.

The farmer was Edward O'Connell, 44, who had employed the youths, Merrill Smith, 17, and Fred (Lucky) Dubay, 16, to work on his farm near here.

O'Connell left his home yesterday, leaving his wife, Jessie, 43, alone. His children, Mary Catherine, 14, Sue, 12, and Edward, six, were at school. Smith, son of an Aurora, Ill., real estate man, and Dubay, who later identified himself as a fugitive from a reformatory at South Windham, Me., were digging potatoes.

Mrs. O'Connell told authorities that she had admitted the youths to the house when they asked for a drink and that they had seized her husband's shotgun and rifle.

Sandal For Tire Fashioned From Rubber Door Mat

Frederick W. Snook, Southern Oregon district manager for the Investors Syndicate, could see his tires going and with them his chances of continuing the travel necessary to sale of securities, including war bonds. So Mr. Snook did something about it. He bought a rubber mat, made of separate links about two inches in length and a half inch thick. Dismantling the mat, he made a "sandal" to go around the tread of his tire, kept in place with an arrangement similar to the tire chains used in winter driving.

The "sandal," total cost \$5, looks efficient and although in use for only a few miles to date, it may be that Mr. Snook "has something there."

WIFE SPANKED BY RICH HUSBAND IS DIVORCE PLAINT

Los Angeles, Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—Pretty Irma Somermeier, 26, former Buenos Aires nightclub entertainer, charged in her separate maintenance suit that her wealthy husband, Thomas G. Somermeier, spanked her "unmercifully" when she refused to play poker and objected to his "ex-girl friends."

In the initial hearing yesterday on her suit against Somermeier, heir to the Andrew Jergens lotion fortune, Mrs. Somermeier said her husband told her she must be "broad minded" about his displays of affection toward former feminine friends because customs in the United States differed from those in Argentina.

She told Superior Judge Ruben S. Schmidt that she married the wealthy sportsman in Argentina three years ago, after a nine-day "sign language" courtship. She said when she married Somermeier she could speak no English and he didn't understand Spanish, "so we talked in a sort of sign language."

Two witnesses for Mrs. Somermeier, Mrs. Bessie Price and Mrs. Thelma Johnson, told the court Somermeier had spanked his wife one night when she refused to take part in a poker game at Mrs. Johnson's Raymond, Cal., ranch.

"Mr. Somermeier grabbed his wife by the arm, took her upstairs and then we heard sounds of a spanking and screams," Mrs. Johnson said.

VICHY IN EFFORT TO SELL "PETAIN"

Vichy, Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—The Vichy government was busily engaged today in one of the greatest high-pressure publicity campaigns France ever had seen in an endeavor to bulwark the position of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain with the French people.

More than 200 writers, artists, and others were employed full-time in handling Petain's personal propaganda. Their quarters covered 12 times the floor space of the French foreign office.

Nine biographers of Petain have been written, reviewed, and published under the control of his propaganda staff.

Scores of artists, medalists, engravers, and sculptors have come to Vichy, and their compositions have been turned out in mass production in terre cotta, bronze, plaster or parchment.

HITLER ABANDONS HOPE OF RED FALL SWEDES INFORMED

Fuehrer Starting Defenses to Hold Eastern Gains and Free Army, is Declaration.

Stockholm, Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—Adolf Hitler, abandoning hope

that Germany can crush Russia, has started building defenses to hold his eastern gains so the bulk of his army will be free to meet the threat of a second front in the west, unusually well informed sources said today.

The same sources expressed belief that Hitler might start a peace offensive this winter and tell the German people that a separate peace with Russia was necessary without the total victory he had promised them.

Chain of Citadels
Informants said the new German defenses in the east would not be along a continuous line, like the west wall opposite France or the old French Maginot line, but a chain of hedgehog-like citadels designed to permit a relatively few men, garrison troops, to hold the Rus-

sians while the main German armies moved to western Europe.

The position of the new eastern defense line naturally was secret but informants reported that in parts of northern and central Russia it had already been defined, and that construction of actual defenses had been started.

In the south, it was said, the Germans hoped to make further gains and then orient their defense line as far as possible on the Volga river.

Double-crossing and treachery are not comprehended by liberty-loving Americans, but they are remembered and they will be avenged. One way is to invest in U. S. A. war savings bonds.

British Sea Strength Making Fast Revival, Admiralty Lord Says

London, Sept. 22.—(U.P.)—Naval observers today interpreted a speech of First Lord of the Admiralty A. V. Alexander as a revelation that Britain now has no fewer than 14 battleships, five aircraft carriers, 78 cruisers and a huge fleet of destroyers, including four new battleships to replace the ill-fated Barnham, Prince of Wales, Hood and Repulse.

Speaking at Sheffield, Alexander declared that Britain had replaced four aircraft carriers and 22 cruisers in addition to

the capital ships lost in the last two and a quarter years—since June, 1940.

"We lost a considerable number of destroyers," Alexander said, "but they, too, have been more than replaced."

The four new battleships were believed to be of the 35,000-ton King George V class, planned in 1939. Since then, two have made an appearance.

this year in your
Home Canning**

Read and remember these precautionary suggestions that come from the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau. They will help protect your canned fruits and jellies from mold—help protect your canned meats, vegetables, fish and poultry from dangerous bacterial spoilage.

To avoid the danger of spoilage that botulism bacteria brings, pressure cooking is the only really safe method of processing meat, fish, poultry, and all vegetables except tomatoes. The pressure cooker maintains the above-boiling temperature required for thorough sterilization.

Tomatoes and fruits, because they are acid, don't favor growth of botulism bacteria, so you may can fruits and tomatoes by any reliable method that's convenient.



Sterilization of jars, lids, and rubbers is always important. Examine them before you begin, and discard any that are nicked and cracked, because such defects prevent a perfect seal. For the same reason, be sure jars and lids fit together tightly.

Wash jars (and old lids, if re-usable) in hot soap suds; rinse well; cover with warm water in a large kettle or dish pan, and boil 15 minutes to sterilize. A clean dish towel on the bottom of the pan guards against breakage. Let jars stand in hot water until they're ready to use.

Sterilize new tops or lids by placing in pan and covering with boiling water. Always use new rubbers, and dip in boiling water to sterilize before using. There are several kinds of fruit jars and lids, so be sure you thoroughly understand the kind you use. Because sealing methods differ.



No matter what method of canning you use—(open kettle, hot or cold pack), no matter what means of processing (water bath, steam cooker or pressure cooker)—be sure to carry out the specific directions that fits the method you are using.

Ordinarily the hot pack or pre-cook canning method is considered best. Bring the food to be canned to the boiling point; pack into hot sterilized jars and process. 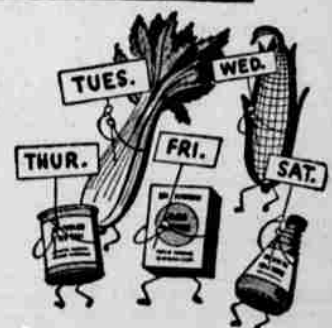
