

HOWARD DISTRICT WILL RUN BUS TO CITY HIGH SCHOOLS

Starting Monday, September 28, the Howard school will begin transportation of pupils to Medford senior and junior high schools.

The bus will leave the Howard school at 7:20 a. m. and go north on the Old Pacific highway to McKibben's corner; it will then return to the school and leave the second time at about 7:30 a. m. going west on Howard avenue to De Bar where it will turn east on De Bar to the Old Pacific highway, then south on Pacific highway to Berrydale, then west on Berrydale to a junction with the New Pacific highway which will be followed east to the Big Y corner.

The bus will leave the senior high school for the return at 3:30 p. m. coming back by the Junior high school.

The bus service is free to any high school student who is a resident of the Howard school district, and those wishing to take advantage of the service should be at one of the following places, as the bus will not stop at each home to pick up students:

- 1—Howard school.
- 2—Corner of DeBar and Howard.
- 3—Junction of Midway and Old Pacific Highways.
- 4—Stamens corner.
- 5—Junction of Berrydale with Howard avenue at New Highway.
- 6—The Big Y corner.

WORKERS NEEDED IN WAR EFFORT

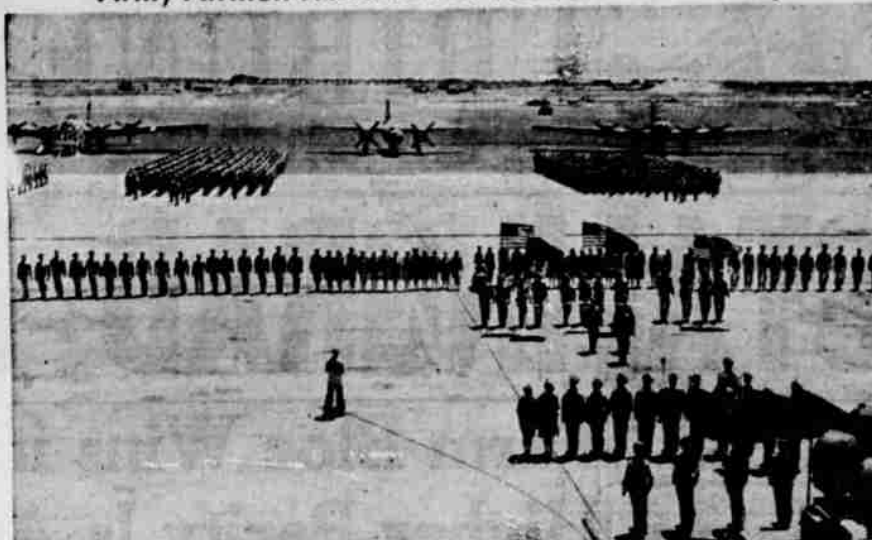
The United States Civil Service Commission has announced the urgent need for civilian workers in a wide variety of jobs connected with the war effort, and anyone desiring to apply should address their applications to the civil service representative, Armory building, Medford.

Needed for work in Alaska are aircraft mechanics, electricians, firemen, laborers, telephone electricians among others, with pay ranging from \$7.60 a day for laborers. Pay is based on a 40-hour week, with time and a half for overtime.

Needed for the army transport service are carpenters, wheelmen, oilers, firemen, wipers, stewards, cooks, meatcutters, bakers, messmen, refrigeration engineers and officers. Other civil service positions now open are mechanic learners, ward attendants, auto mechanics, stenographers and typists.

AUTO USE TAX IS SUB FOR GAS TAX

Washington, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—The Internal Revenue bureau today reported that the automobile use tax more than made up for the nearly \$10,000,000 drop in gasoline tax revenue in August.

Total internal revenue receipts in August were \$681,667,158, an increase of \$207,296,183 over the same month last year, the bureau reported.

The report showed that the gasoline tax yielded \$28,662,169 this August against \$38,257,258 last August. The new automobile use tax netted \$13,262,732 which exceeded the drop in gasoline revenue by \$3,667,623.

BUCK ESTATE \$500,000

nearly \$500,000, according to records filed late today in federal court for the District of Columbia. The bulk of the estate was left to his widow, Mrs. Eva B. Buck.
