

MEDICAL OFFICER IS GUEST SPEAKER AT HEALTH MEET

Col. Charles Hutter, chief medical officer at Camp White, was guest speaker at the Jackson County Public Health association meeting yesterday afternoon at the county court house auditorium. He discussed health problems and methods of maintaining good health especially during time of war. The colonel mentioned ways of the army that would profit the civilian and stressed the point that Camp White and the county health department were planning a 100 per cent cooperation program in problems relative to the health of the community.

He stated that citizens of the present era have reached a "lolly-pop and ice cream cone eating age" as compared to pioneers who found a healthy diet in the "beef-steak eating age." He pointed out that the mechanical inventions have caused the individual to follow an easy life and that the body must be adjusted to the demands of modern living. He suggested vitamins be added to the diet if necessary to maintain a health balance but said that vitamins can still be found in food by giving families a well-rounded menu. He indicated this by stressing the daily food intake of soldiers in the U. S. army.

He discussed other points of interest between the camp and civilian and will appear before the association at a later date for further discussion of pertinent details.

Prior to Col. Hutter's talk a business session was held with discussion of the coming year's program. Miss Helen Bullis discussed opportunities in the field of home nursing and Mrs. Shelby Tuttle spoke on Nurses' Aid and its opportunity of service to community and country.

A luncheon for chairmen of the annual seal sale was held during the noon hour with the county well represented. Plans were laid for the annual campaign.

Dr. A. E. Merkel, county health officer, held a question-answer period for problems of community health interest and later introduced the speaker. A tea hour in charge of Gold Hill and Central Point women closed the afternoon.

War Won or Lost Before Russ Frost Warns Nazi Leader

Washington, Sept. 25.—(U.P.)—Allied diplomatic sources here have received a copy of a recent speech by Dr. Albert Speer, Nazi minister of armaments and production, quoting him as saying:

"We must win this year by the end of October, when the Russian winter begins, or we will have lost once and for all."

"We must win with the weapons we have now and not with those we will have next year."

"We can only win if every man capable of bearing arms is at the front and we must put all we have in the front line whether this is going to be deleterious to post-war industry or not."

That statement, in addition to recent strenuous efforts of the German government to force labor and military strength in the occupied countries to join the Nazi war effort, stimulated belief here that Germany is faced with a growing shortage of manpower.

WOMEN WILL AID MAIL DELIVERIES SAYS P.O. CHIEF

Boston, Sept. 25.—(U.P.)—Thousands of women now holding clerical positions in post offices throughout the nation soon may be given the task of delivering the mail, Postmaster-General Frank C. Walker said today.

"The postal service has already lost more than five per cent of its carriers to the armed services," Walker said at a press conference. "Many more will be taken for fighting service before this war is won. Eventually, we'll have to take women to fill their places."

Postmaster Frank DeSouza said today that it had not as yet been necessary to transfer women clerical employees to positions as foot carriers at Medford postoffice. "We have thus far been able to place women employees in clerical positions and let men carry the 70-pound mail sacks," he stated.

There is one woman carrier, however. She is Mrs. Elva Sutton, who delivers special delivery mail by automobile. She has been employed in this capacity for the past month.

USO COUNCIL TO EXPAND EFFORTS FOR SERVICE MEN

Medford USO council, meeting last night, moved unanimously toward more active participation in the local service men's program. A sub-committee was created to review and expand the membership and to nominate new officers. The council will meet again Oct. 13 to act on the report of this sub-committee.

Members of the sub-committee appointed to revitalize the council were Sam Molton, chairman, Father F. W. Black, and Mrs. E. H. Judd.

The group recognized the need for cooperation in this fall's chest campaign and pledged wholehearted support.

It was felt that no immediate action should be sought on the opening of the Salvation Army

service center originally contemplated by the USO. Further action on this will be held back pending completion of the Ford Garage building renovation, and on further evidence as to what need beyond the service available through the two clubs now in operation may be presented at a later date when Camp White has its full complement of men.

The council further agreed to make a full review of policies covering use of volunteers in the USO program and in particular the functioning of the Junior Hostess group and the

handling of USO dances. The Junior Hostess group has formed its own organization and is reviewing principles and rules for members with the assistance of senior counselors.

The council agreed to invite the hostess counselors and the girls' and boys' elected leaders to attend the meeting at which the matter will be discussed.

Faber Stevenson, regional USO executive, acted as temporary chairman.
