BLOCKED KICK BY
CALIFORNIA WINS
6-0 FROM GAELS

Berkeley, Cal., Sept. 27.—(U.P.)—California's Golden Bears, the pre-season choice for the Pacific coast conference football crown, encountered a stubborn and daring band of galloping Gaels from St. Mary's College today, but managed to squeeze out a 6-0 victory before 35,000 fans in Memorial stadium.

A blocked kick in the third quarter resulted in the touchdown that saved Coach Leonard (Stub) Allison eleven from defeat or, at best, a scoreless tie.

After the Gaels, led for the first time this year by Coach James M. Phelan, had roared to within five yards of a score just before the halftime gun sounded, the Bears got their break and made the most of it.

Herrero, California guard, crashed through to block Roy Guisti's punt on the St. Mary's 18. The ball was recovered by Ferguson, rangy Bear end, who made the one-yard stripe.

From there, Jurkovich, halfback, rammed over for the score. Quarterback Merlo's attempt at conversion was wide.

St. Mary's under-rated squad outplayed the Bears in every other period of the game.

TROJANS BEATEN

Tulane University's green wave took advantage of every break today and completely engulfed the University of Southern California Trojans, 27-13 before 35,000 fans in Memorial Coliseum.

Led by Little Lou Thomas and Jimmy Ely, a pair of swift halfbacks, the wave rolled over two touchdowns in the second quarter and bounced right back with another pair in the third period.

The favored Trojans, played off their feet in the first half, staged an uprising in the last period, sparked by second string halfback Jim Hardy who accounted for both USC tallies by plunging over each time from the six inch line.

Tulane completely outplayed the Trojans in every department throughout the game for the final period when the USC reserves powered their pair of touchdowns over Tulane substitutes.

BROOKLYN GAINS
WITH CARDS IDLE

The Brooklyn Dodgers clung to their last chance of tying for the National league flag Saturday by defeating the Phils, 8-3, at Philadelphia while the leading Cardinals' game with the Chicago Cubs at St. Louis was postponed because of weather.

Brooklyn's victory trimmed the Cards' league lead to 1 1/2 games but even if they win their last game with the Phils Sunday, the Dodgers may still lose the pennant by one game should both games of the St. Louis-Chicago doubleheader be cancelled by weather.

In the only American league game played, the Indians clinched a tie for fourth place by blanking the Tigers, 3-0, at Cleveland.

MEDFORD BEATEN
14 TO 0 BY HUGE
MARSHFIELD TEAM

Coach Arnold Praises Fight
of Tornado—Dippel Hurt
—Grants Pass Next.

"They fought their hearts out and I'm proud of them. Against overwhelming weight odds they never gave up, and if they continue to show the same spirit and scrap they'll win some ball games, never worry."

Thus did Coach Lorne Arnold, after admitting simply that "we lost to the better ball club," describe the performance of Medford's Black Tornado after its Friday night loss to the gigantic Marshfield high Pirates, 14 to 0; an eleven that took the field with a weight average of 181 pounds to Medford's 166.

Led by Kenny Maine, a 205-pound fullback and Jim O'Neal, 165-pound left half, the Pirates of Orville (Red) Bailey shoved over touchdowns in the first and fourth quarters.

Employing wide sweeps around the ends with O'Neal and Maine carrying the ball, the Pirates scored their first touchdown six minutes after the game started, with O'Neal taking it across.

In the fourth quarter the winners got their other score when O'Neal fired a long forward pass to Jerry Ford, left end. Medford had successfully halted Marshfield's running attack after that first-period touchdown, the defensive halfbacks coming up fast to smear the wide sweeps.

In the second quarter the Tornado tallied a touchdown on an intricate forward pass followed by two laterals, but the play was called back. Had the score been allowed, the entire complexion of the game might have been changed, Arnold said.

Starting on their own 35-yard line the Tigers moved to the Marshfield 45, where Jack Baker, quarterback, shot a forward pass to Bob Young, right end. Young, after catching the ball, lateraled to Darrell Moneth, left end, and Moneth tackled on the 15-yard stripe in turn tossed a lateral to Steve Dippel, left halfback, who went over standing up. However, the beautifully-executed play was called back by the officials, who claimed the second lateral was tossed forward.

In the second half Medford fought the Pirates off their feet, but couldn't generate an offense against such giants as Left Tackle Gordon Texley, 250 pounds; Center Walt Kinney, 185; Right Tackle Bill Morin, 195 and Right End Jack Schneiderman, 185.

Dippel, Arnold said, suffered a painful hip injury and might not be available for the Grants Pass game here next Friday night. The injury was described as being either a bad bruise or a torn muscle fibre. Bob Davis, right guard, received a bruised calf, and most of the other players were considerably banged up in the tough struggle.

Playing especially fine ball for Medford were Lowell Fleser, right tackle; Sheldon, a reserve; Corchoran, left guard; Baker and Bill Bayliss, fullback. Bob Davis called the plays.

Marshfield made 10 first downs to Medford's four. The Tornado will practice daytimes the coming week, with Arnold planning to drill the lads on offensive blocking and faster and lower defensive charges.

WISCONSIN TIES
WITH IRISH, 7-7

Madison, Wis., Sept. 26.—(U.P.)—

An underdog Wisconsin team spoiled the heralded debut of Notre Dame's "T" formation today by holding the highly touted Irish to a 7 to 7 tie before a crowd of 32,000.

Notre Dame, undefeated in nine games a season ago and rated a top contender for the mythical national championship this year, threatened repeatedly but the Irish couldn't click when yardage meant points.

The Irish counted upon Angelo Bertelli, who had a bad day. The little Italian youngster made good on only four out of 13 aerial tosses today. His passing record was further clouded by two interceptions at costly states of the game. The "T" failed to provide Bertelli the pass protection to which he was accustomed.

Where Bertelli failed, Notre Dame came up with a brilliant sophomore fullback in Jim Mello and his great running accounted for almost one-half the yardage the Irish gained.

STANFORD LOSES
TO COUGARS, 6-0

Stanford University, Cal., Sept. 26.—(U.P.)—One swift and effective aerial thrust midway in the second period today gave Washington State a 6 to 0 victory over Stanford in a tight football game witnessed by a small crowd of approximately 12,000 fans.

Jay Stoves, a left halfback who threw the football around in a fashion to cause Washington State supporters to forget about Billy Sewell, their sharp shooter of last season, was the hero of the Washington State win.

After his team had worked the ball down to Stanford's 25 yard line in a series of plunges by Stoves and fullback Bob Kennedy, Stoves dropped back on second down and looked for a receiver for a pass. He shot the ball straight and true into Benneis' arms. Benneis outran two Stanford men and finally flung himself over the goal line.

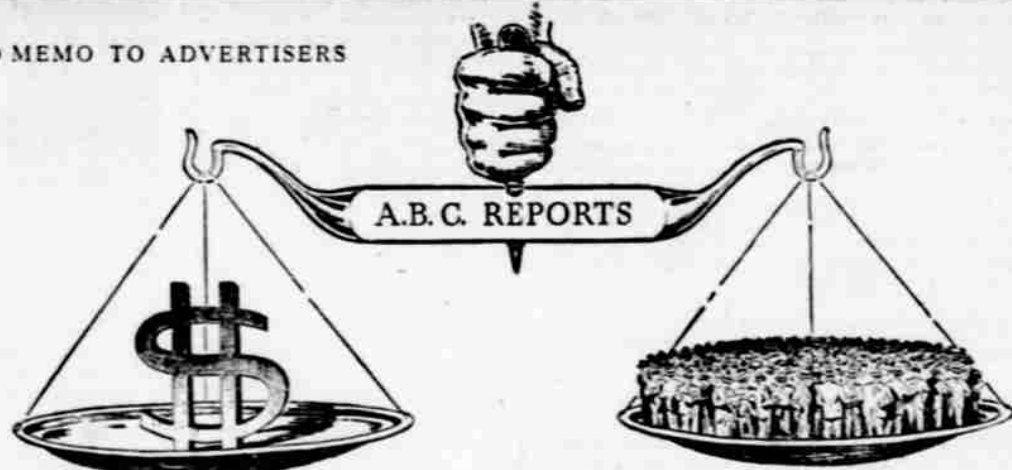
