

BEAVERS SOLD TO PORTLAND GROUP

Portland, Sept. 26—(U.P.)—The Portland Baseball club, perennial cellar-dweller in the Pacific Coast league, was sold today to six Portland businessmen.

Announcement of the sale was made by A. J. Cook, sales manager of the Lucky Lager Brewing company, who represented the new owners.

The group purchased 90 per cent of the stock owned by E. J. Scheffer, Rollie Scheffer and Dr. Robert Scheffer.

William Klepper, one-time president of the Beavers and owner of the Seattle club, was immediately appointed general manager. Cook announced. Officers will be elected at a stockholders' meeting next Wednesday.

Klepper hinted Manager Frank Brazill would not be retained. The new business manager said he intended to obtain, if possible, a playing manager, preferably a top-flight catcher.

Sale of the club marked the sixth time in 42 years it has changed hands. Terms were not disclosed.

VOLGA CITY RENT BY SHELLS, FIRE

Stalingrad, Sept. 23—(Delayed) (U.P.)—Bombs and shells crash endlessly in Stalingrad, while the women and children still left in the city huddle in basements and caves.

The sky is afire and the very earth staggers under the incessant bombardment. Artillery thunders incessantly; the crash of bombs is heard day and night.

There is no such thing as a safe spot in Stalingrad today, but that no longer bothers the people.

The front sprawls over 40 miles, extending from the city itself to its suburbs, factories, and workers' settlements.

The very pattern of the main street of Stalingrad has been obliterated. Others are so torn up by bombs that they are impassable.

STEINHARDT COMING HOME

WESTERN THRIFT

BRIDGES GRANTED ADDITIONAL TIME TO FILE BRIEFS

Sacramento, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Attorneys for Harry Bridges, West Coast CIO leader, today were granted 10 days in which to file final briefs after Federal Judge Martin I. Welsh took under submission a petition for a writ of habeas corpus to prevent Bridges' deportation to Australia as an undesirable alien.

Bridges' three attorneys argued two days that previous deportation hearings were unfair. They contended U. S. Attorney General Francis Biddle ignored an earlier immigration board of appeals ruling in Bridges' favor when he ordered the alien labor leader deported in June. Bridges was not present in court.

Biddle in his order said it had been proved Bridges had been affiliated with the Communist party which Biddle declared advocated overthrow of the U. S. government by force and violence.

In the final hours of the hearing here U. S. District Attorney Frank J. Hennessy argued the defense claim Bridges was vital to the war effort was not the issue. He pointed out Bridges had failed to become a citizen in his 22 years in this country.

HOLLYWOOD FILM IRKS ICELANDERS

Reykjavik, Iceland, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—A Hollywood version of Iceland got a cold reception in this country today, partly because it showed ice skating in Iceland in July; partly because a United States marine "gets the girl" from an Icelander.

To make matters worse, Icelanders groaned, the unlucky Icelander, played by Sterling Holloway, is a ridiculous type who couldn't reasonably be expected to win the heart of any girl, let alone Sonja Henie, star of the picture, which, to sharpen the point, has been broadly titled "Iceland."

The foreign office announced that its minister at Washington has been instructed to ask the state department to ban exhibition of the movie, or at least to order changes in it.

The picture has not been exhibited here and is not likely to be.

RELAX RULES FOR TIRE RATIONING

Washington, Sept. 26—(U.P.)—

The office of price administration tonight relaxed its tire rationing regulations to allow use of rubber tires for eight purposes heretofore considered non-essential.

Dental surgeons, itinerant dentists and midwives were made eligible for new tires and tubes, if they are able to show that they have a "substantial" number of patients accessible only by automobile.

These activities were added to the services which may be performed on rationed tires: transportation of civilians being evacuated from danger zones, of juries, witnesses, prisoners, and of churchgoers between their homes and their places of regular weekly worship to attend religious services "where no other adequate transportation facilities exist."

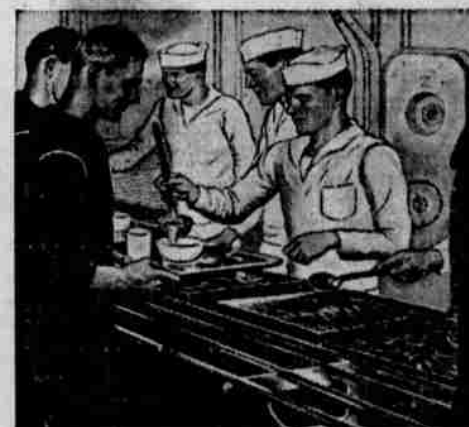
