Airmen Play Deadly Game With Jap Subs at Kiska

Alaska Defense command Headquarters, Sept. 28—(Delayed) U.P.—A pair of Japanese submarines were the object of a deadly game of "ring around the rosie" played by U. S. army and Canadian fighter pilots in last Friday's raid on Kiska harbor.

Attacks of the fighter planes on the two subs was a feature of the most recent air assault on the enemy-held base in the Aleutians.

The low-flying pursuit ships also destroyed several Japanese single-engine fighters, hit two cargo ships, setting one afire, and wrecked possibly eight out of 10 cruiser-type biplanes. Group Commander Jack Chennault, son of Gen. Claire Chennault of the former Flying Tigers of China, sent one Jap fighter to its doom over Kiska harbor, using tactics taught by his famous father.

The Canadian squadron commander, Kenneth Boomer of Ottawa, Canada, downed another Jap fighter and a third Jap fighter was shot down by Lieut. Gerald R. Johnson of Eugene, Ore.

A Jap submarine surfaced under a fighter squadron led by Major Wilbur Miller of Livingston, Tex. The squadron formed a circle with the submarine on the outer rim and as each plane came around, cannon slugs beat a chorus on the vessel. Each plane got three cracks at the sub before it dove.

As in previous raids on Kiska, all the planes were army craft. There were no losses in the attack, the first joint U. S.-Canadian raid.

"The Japs are now getting an idea of what Corregidor was like for our men," an air force officer said after the raid.
