

BOY SCOUTS GIVE CHEST DIRECTORS PLANS FOR YEAR

The Boy Scouts of America, an agency of the Medford Community Chest recently submitted a report to the board of directors outlining in details the organization's problems for 1943 and listing some of the major accomplishments of 1942. The report showed a steady gain in membership during 1942, but also pointed out problems of adult volunteer leadership confronting it. Many Scout and Cub leaders have gone into the armed services in recent months and others have left the community for work in war related activities.

New men are being recruited as rapidly as possible to fill these vacancies so that the full value of the Boy Scout program may be realized by the boys of Medford. Now that school is under way it is expected, according to the report made to the Chest board the following services have been accomplished by the Scouts of this council since December 7, 1941.

Collected and shipped 410,000 pounds of waste paper. Salvaged 228,000 pounds of scrap metal and 46,000 pounds of scrap rubber.

Delivered for the Office of Price Administration 12,000 price control leaflets. Provided messenger service in several communities for the Office of Civilian Defense.

Participated in patriotic gatherings and parades.

Placed posters for the Red Cross, Tuberculosis Association, United China Relief and others.

Collected books for army camps and carried out numerous smaller projects in every community near Medford.

PHEASANT KILLER GIVEN \$25 FINE

Wayne P. Vincent of the Central Point district, charged with having in his possession a game bird during a closed season, plead guilty and was fined \$25 and costs in justice court yesterday. It was charged he killed a Chinese pheasant in an orchard. The bird season opens about mid-October.

Parks R. Shelley, charged with reckless driving was fined \$25 and costs on a plea of guilty. He was charged with driving his car in a weaving manner on North Central avenue during a traffic lull. Shelley, a high school boy, admitted the charge, and told the court, "I knew better." He was arrested by the sheriff's office.

Aubrey C. Miles of Ashland was fined \$1.50 and costs for no auto license.

CARDIN IS HELD FOR GRAND JURY IN TAXI HOLDUP

Troy A. Cardin, charged with assault and robbery, was held to await the action of the next grand jury, following a preliminary hearing in justice court yesterday. Bond was fixed at \$5,000.

Lorian A. Chitwood, similarly charged, will be arraigned later. He was returned from California where he was arrested last week.

The pair stand accused of holding up Isma Anne Poole, Grants Pass woman Taxi driver last August 25, and robbing her of \$25 and two tires on her car. She identified Cardin as the passenger who compelled her at pistol point to drive on a side road where, following the hold-up she was compelled to disrobe. The robbery occurred near the Rocky Point bridge on the Pacific highway.

Chitwood, with his wife, Grace R. Chitwood, Cardin and Harvey M. Rowley and Neal Holbrook are accused of burglary not in a dwelling. He waived preliminary hearing on the charge and was ordered held to the grand jury. It is charged they entered and stole articles from the cabins of Reginald Parsons and Tim Daily in the Dead Indian district several weeks ago.

Cardin and Mrs. Chitwood were given further time in which to plead. Rowley and Holbrook, both 17 years, and living in Ashland, were turned over to the juvenile court.

CALIFORNIA JAPS TO START MOVE

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—(U.P.)—The Wartime Civil Control administration announced today 8,000 Japanese evacuees will be moved within the next three weeks to relocation centers in Arkansas and Utah.

Approximately 640 Japanese taken from San Francisco to Santa Anita will be moved October 7 to Delta, Utah. The next day 2,450 Japanese, formerly of the San Pedro-Long Beach area will begin moving to Jerome, Ark.

Starting October 2, the 5,000 Japanese at the Fresno center will be moved to Jerome.
