Ashland, Oct. 1—(Spl.)—Funeral services for Edgar Lloyd Bryant, 56, who died here September 29, will be held at the Litwiler chapel at 2 p. m. Friday, the Rev. J. R. Turnbull officiating. Interment will be in Ashland cemetery. The Medford Eagles lodge, of which he was a member, will be in charge.

Mr. Bryant, who was born in Boston, Mass., July 4, 1886, resided on Route 2, Ashland. He passed away at the home of his mother, Mrs. Ruth Turner, following a week's illness with a heart condition.

He is survived by two daughters, June Bryant of Ashland and Mrs. Ruth DeLapins of Portland; his mother and one brother, Grover Bryant of Medford.
