BATTLE TROPHIES DONATED TO USO BY COLE HOLMES

Medford USO has received some battle trophies from the last World war. These have been donated by Cole Holmes of the American Legion post who found them in France and the trophies are on display at the USO center, 232 East Main street. These will be placed on sale to the highest bidder for war bonds at the USO carnival to be held October 19 at the Oriental Gardens.

The trophies include a German bayonet found in a dugout at Varennes (Meuse-Argonne offensive), October 10 or 11, 1918; a helmet picked up July 18, 1918, near Soissons (Aisne-Marne offensive), and a second helmet found near Marback (St. Mihiel), September 13, 1918.

Money spent during the evening, it was explained, will be returned to the spender by war savings stamps, and it is anticipated that the bidders on the trophies will return the trophies to USO for a small museum in the new building. However, they will have the option of keeping the trophy if they desire.

The carnival is attracting much attention in the community and many service clubs are cooperating in the event. An army band will furnish music for the dancing and other entertainment is also scheduled.
