

Cards Blank Yanks 2-0 to Take One-Game Lead in World Series

BOMBERS HELD TO SIX BINGLES BY SOUTHPAW WHITE

Redbirds Score in Third and Ninth—Victors Field in Sensational Style.

New York, Oct. 3.—(U.P.)—The inspired St. Louis Cardinals, seizing advantage of every break and aided by the shut-out pitching of Southpaw Ernie White, defeated the New York Yankees 2 to 0, today in the third game of the world series.

It was the first time the Yankees had been shut out in a world series game since 1926 when Jess Haines of these same Cardinals turned the trick. Today's victory sent the Cardinals into the lead, two games to one—the first time the Yankees have been behind in the "games won" column of the world series since the 1926 championship.

The official attendance was 69,123—largest crowd ever to see a world series game.

A crowd that stretched to the top rafters of Yankee stadium on this afternoon watched White hold the sluggers in the Yankees' batting order to six scattered hits.

Spurgeon Chandler, carrying the hopes of the Yankees, yielded only three hits before he retired for a pinch hitter in the eighth inning. But the Cardinals, making no mistakes and surging through to capitalize on every break, were not to be denied.

The Cards made their first tally in the third inning after St. Louis was thrown out, apparently while trying to beat out a bunt. Manager Billy Southworth of the Cards objected vigorously, claiming that the bunt had landed first in the batter's box and hence should be a foul. After a lengthy huddle with the four umpires, it was decided that the ball had gone foul and that Marion was not out.

Another Chance
Whitey Kurowski was on first at the time. Marion, back at bat, tried the bunt business again and beat it out this time, thereby saving an all-important out and advancing Kurowski to second.

Both Kurowski and Marion advanced on the next play when Pitcher White was out on a sacrifice, and Kurowski scored the first run of the game when Jimmy Brown was thrown out after a fast grounder to Gordon.

The Cards registered their next run in the turbulent ninth session, aided by Breuer's wild throw to second. Brown had singled to right. Then fast-stepping Terry Moore reached first on a fielder's choice, as Breuer tried to throw out Brown at second, but his toss to Rizzuto was wild, permitting Brown to advance to third and Moore to make second. Brown scored when Country Slaughter singled to center.

The suspense held the crowd in its seats until the last out—an out that caused a groan from the thousands of Yankee fans.

Joe Dimaggio was on first base by virtue of his single to right. Joe Gordon and Roy Cullenbine were out, and up to the plate stepped Big Charlie "King Kong" Keller. Keller made a mighty try. He blasted the ball toward the right field stands. The crowd rose with a frenzied roar, but the ball settled into the waiting hands of Slaughter just in front of the 344 foot sign on the lower right stands. A couple more feet of altitude would have transformed it into a four-bagger instead of the final out.

"Homers" Flogged
But that was just one of the bad breaks the Yanks got today. They missed two potential homers by similar margins in the seventh inning. Joe Gordon sent a drive sailing toward the distant left field stands, but it dropped back into the eager hands of Musial, who had his back against the lower boxes. And the next man up, Keller, whammed one out to the right field stands—in almost the same spot where Slaughter took his next mighty drive in the ninth.

Some of the fans yelled, "Robber! robber!" when Slaughter pulled down that first Keller drive in the seventh.

In the dressing room Manager Joe McCarthy announced that he will send to the Yankee mound tomorrow Hank Borowy, a right-hander. Hank will face either Southpaw Max Lanier or high-handed Moe Cooper, who lost the opening contest for the Cards.

Iowa Naval Fliers Hand Gophers First Defeat in 19 Games

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 4.—(U.P.)—One of football's great winning streaks was shattered today as the Iowa Pre-flight Naval Training school edged the University of Minnesota 7 to 6 in a thrill-packed game before 37,500 spectators.

The loss was the first for Minnesota in 19 contests and by a quirk caused by the war the defeat was administered by a team coached by Lt. Col. Bernie Bierman, the gray-haired grid genius who built up the Gophers' string over a stretch of three seasons before he answered the call to service.

The game was a savage battle between two fast, rugged and alert lines. The touchdowns both came in the first quarter and were scored in electrifying fashion.

Minnesota hopped into the lead eight minutes after the opening kickoff when Bill Daley, the Gophers' great left halfback, sprinted 55 yards on a perfectly executed play. His attempt for the extra point was blocked.

Shortly before the opening period ended, Fisher punted to Herman Frickey who caught the ball on the fly on the gopher two-yard-line instead of letting it roll across the goal line. Punting from behind his own goal line, Frickey kicked back to Fisher and the former Ohio State star took it on the Minnesota 38-yard line and ran for the touchdown. Fred Gage of Illinois made the conversion to put the cadets in front to stay.

HUSKIES AND USC STRUGGLE TO 0-0 TIE AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Oct. 3.—(U.P.)—The University of Washington Huskies, combining an unexpected air-tight pass defense with a fast-breaking line, stalled the University of Southern California aerial offensive today before 26,000 fans but the Huskies failed to develop scoring punch in enemy territory and the game ended in a scoreless tie.

In the third quarter an intercepted pass and two U. S. C.umbles gave the Huskies three golden scoring opportunities but the Trojans, playing heads-up ball each time fought their way out of difficulty, bracing to take the ball on downs, twice on the 16-yard stripe and once on the four.

Each time the supreme kicking of Left End Ralph Heywood carried the Trojans out of danger.

Again in the fourth quarter an intercepted pass gave the Huskies the ball on the Trojan 24-yard stripe but the Husky drive bogged down on the 14.

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 3.—(U.P.)—A smart, fast squad of Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets scored a brilliant, 13 to 6 upset over Notre Dame today to hand Irish Mentor Frank Leahy his first defeat in 22 games.

Leahy left a sick bed to direct Notre Dame strategy. With nearly 30,000 fans he watched Georgia Tech hold off the Irish throughout the first half and then strike swiftly for the first score late in the third quarter.

Eddie Prokop, a sophomore brother of Joe, who once played for Notre Dame, set up the score with a 14-yard pass which Herb Coleman, Irish sopho center, tipped into the air only to see it fall into the hands of Pat McHugh on the one yard line. Ralph Plaster who scored here as a sophomore two years ago, immediately plunged over and kicked the extra point.

IRISH UPSET BY GA. TECH, 13-6

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—(U.P.)—Two effective forward passes with Alyn Beals, University of Santa Clara's candidate for the mythical All-American, acting out the hero's role in the most approved fashion, gave Santa Clara a 14 to 6 victory over Stanford University's determined football team before 30,000 fans in Kezar stadium.

Beals, a senior athlete from San Francisco, teamed up with Halfback Jesse Freitas, a junior from Red Bluff, Calif., to insure Santa Clara's victory against a team whose stalwart line refused to allow much headway all afternoon.

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CAVEMEN AERIAL ATTACK CONQUERS TIGERS, 12 TO 6

Clayton Passes Twice to Lathrop For Touchdowns—Adams For Locals.

Two unerring forward passes from Southpaw Ray Clayton to big Chet Lathrop gave the inspired Grants Pass Cavemen a pair of touchdowns and a 12 to 6 conquest of Medford's Black Tornado here Friday night in the opening game of the 1942 Southern Oregon conference season.

Clayton's second scoring aerial, fired from the nine-yard line, occurred early in the fourth period and broke a 6 to 6 tie. Lathrop, right end, was standing all alone in the right corner of the end zone when he flagged the whistling leather to give Grants Pass its first victory over Medford in 12 years.

It was way back in 1930 when the Cavemen had last whipped the locals. By a strange coincidence, the coach of that Grants Pass team was Leonard B. Mayfield, present principal of Medford high. The score of the game was 7 to 6.

The Tornado, whose running attack was throttled to 22 net yards gained by the great defensive play of the two Cavemen ends, Lathrop and Jerry Edwards, plus potency in the middle of the forward wall, managed to launch only one scoring drive, with the touchdown coming a half-minute before the half-time gun.

55-Yard March
The Tigers started on their own 35 and went 65 yards, climaxing the surge by sending Hal Adams, right halfback, wide around his own left end from two yards out. Adams' attempted placekick for the extra point was blocked, leaving the half-time score 6-6.

Bill Bayliss started the drive with a two-yard blast through center and Jack Baker picked up 13 on a quarterback sneak. Bayliss then shot a forward pass to Bob Davis, good for 23 yards and Davis fired to Steve Dippel for 14 and a first down on the Grants Pass 10. Davis made six at right end, Bayliss two at center and a pass was incomplete. On fourth down Adams went wide around the left flank and scored standing up.

The Cavemen got their first touchdown on the opening play of the second quarter. With the ball on Medford's 45-yard stripe, Clayton faded back and to his left and cut loose with a bullet pass down the middle that Lathrop grabbed on the 30. He broke loose from two tacklers and raced straight into the end zone. Johnny Gray's placekick was blocked.

Grants Pass' clinching touchdown was set up by a Medford lateral pass which misfired. Bayliss fumbled the ball and Lathrop recovered on the Medford 12. Gray shot a pass to Edwards good for three yards, and on the next play Clayton tossed to Lathrop in the end zone for the ball game. Gray's placekick was wide.

Tornado Outplayed
The Tigers, although they made six first downs to Grants Pass' five, were completely outplayed on the ground and in the air. Medford got only 22 yards from rushing to Grants Pass' 82, and made 72 yards on six completed passes out of 15 attempted to Grants Pass' 106 yards through the air on five completions in nine tries.

Gray, the Cavemen left halfback, was the big ground-gainer for the winners. He accounted for 51 yards on 16 carries. Baker, with 19 yards gained in four carries, led what offense the Tornado showed on the ground.

Only in the punting department did the locals show superiority. Adams averaging 41 yards on six boots to the 33.8 Grants Pass average on the same number of kicks.

The game was bitterly fought. At one point a wild flurry of

hits occurred in front of the Medford bench, and all through the contest both teams blocked and tackled in jarring fashion.

The Tornado has an open date this week then plays Klamath Falls here the night of October 16.

A disarming exhibition was given at half-time by soldiers of the 91st division.

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OUTPLAYED DUCKS DROP 7-0 BATTLE TO WASH. STATE

Bob Kennedy Tallies Lone Touchdown in Second Period—Oregon Collapses

Pullman, Wash., Oct. 4.—(U.P.)—The Washington State college Cougars today scrapped the University of Oregon's comeback drive, downing the Webfoots 7-0 before a meager homecoming crowd of 6,000 persons who marveled at the one-sidedness of the contest.

The Cougars racked up 16 first downs to one for Oregon, and bottled the Webfoots in their own territory except for a lone burst by Halfback Tommy Roblin in the second period. Roblin got away to the Cougar 38, but Washington State held.

Washington State's touchdown came near the close of the second period, following a 63-yard quick kick by Halfback Jay Stoves. Roblin punted from his own 17, and Stoves brought the ball back to the Webfoot 27.

The Cougars scored in six plays, Fullback Bob Kennedy climaxing the drive by lunging over from the one foot line. Lodos converted, and the score was 7-0.

The most amazing feature of the game was the collapse of the highly-touted Oregon line, which outweighed the Cougar forwards nearly ten pounds to the man. The statistics showed 247 yards gained by rushing for Washington State, against only 57 yards marked up by "Honest John" Warren's ball carriers.

Only Roblin's prodigious kicks, one of which traveled 87 yards, kept Washington State from scoring twice more.

carried Oregon State from its own 26 to the game's first touchdown. Day finally scoring by driving into the blue California forward wall from the one yard line.

As the Beavers cooled off with their 6 to 2 lead, the Bears turned the Oregon State kick off into the start of a one way trip to a touchdown. Pickett scoring around end with 38 seconds left in the half, making it California 8, Oregon 6, at the half.

Oregon State started its pay off drive innocuously enough on its own 27. Smith's attempted pass was knocked into the air and Evensen, Beaver guard, caught the blooper and lumbered up to the 37 before California had it figured out.

The Beavers, gambling now, tried the line on the fourth down and collected dividends with a first down on their own 48. Then Smith came along.

He passed to Zellick twice for first downs, threw to McInnis and the Beavers were knocking at the door from the 13. Two line plays misfired, Smith flipped another one to McInnis on the one yard line. With the crowd pouring wildly down on the field, Smith pierced right guard for a touchdown that wiped out California's fourth straight attempt to beat Oregon State.
