Coffee Has a War to Win...

1. Ways to Conserve Coffee—No Skimping
1. Buy coffee as you do "perishables"—as you need it.
2. Choose the right grind. "Drip" for vacuum or drip pot. "All-purpose" for percolator or boiled.
3. Keep coffee in a clean, tightly covered canister, because the oxygen of the air causes it to oxidize and lose flavor.
4. Measure both coffee and water carefully.
5. Use fresh cold water, and bring it to a galloping boil. Freshly drawn water contains oxygen that sparkles-up the coffee taste, and water at a boil releases that marvelous coffee-flavor.
6. Make only as much coffee at a time as you wish to serve. In short, control the amount of coffee you serve as carefully as you would the amount of any other valuable food.
7. Use leftover coffee to make desserts or puddings.
8. Keep coffee-maker and all drip bags clean. A half-clean coffee-maker ruins flavor.
