

TIN CAN SALVAGE WAITS ARRANGING OF OUTLETS HERE

School Heads Will Delay
Campaign Until Provision
Made For Shipment.

Although the state-wide tin can salvage campaign is scheduled to open in Oregon Tuesday and starts Saturday in Portland, school children in Medford will not be asked to begin the local tin can campaign until a later date. According to local sources no collection of cans will be scheduled here until an outlet is provided for the scrap.

The public will be notified when the campaign is opened in Medford.

The county school superintendent's office stated that the rural schools have been asked not to participate in the campaign as planned by the state department of education. This was deemed advisable due to shortage of means by which the tin cans could be brought to a central gathering spot.

Col. C. G. Hutter of Camp White was guest speaker on the subject "The Doctor in the Army." He described the differences between army and civilian medical practice.
