STREET KETTLES WILL HELP BRING CHRISTMAS CHEER

Salvation Army Asks Public Remembrance of Underprivileged, Aged, Ill.

The Salvation Army Christmas kettles will be on the street corners again tomorrow and the tinkling of the bells will remind of their purpose.

Adjutant Chas. K. Cox, in charge of the local work, said today he hoped there will be no blackout of the Christmas giving spirit and he asked for generous contributions from the public to help the local corps of the Salvation Army bring happiness to many underprivileged boys and girls, with toys and candy, etc., to old people and shut-ins with a present to let them know they are not forgotten, and to remember the soldier boys ill in the hospital at Camp White. Kettle contributions will help make all this possible.

There will be a number of families helped with a Christmas basket or some extras for the Christmas dinner which otherwise they would not have, the adjutant said. A number of old people who are pensioned will need a Christmas basket and some presents this Christmas time.

The Army Christmas kettles were on the streets last Saturday and the response was fine. Starting tomorrow the kettles will be on the streets each week day until Christmas day. Contributions of nickels, dimes, quarters and dollars may be dropped in and those wishing to give a check or bills may mail or take them to the Salvation Army hall.

There are also a number of little Christmas cans located in a number of stores and cafes for convenience of the public. Any contributor knowing of any one who will need assistance at the Christmas time is asked to please notify Adjutant Cox immediately, giving the number of children and their ages in the family. The case will be properly checked to avoid any duplication.

"At such a time as this we need the Christmas spirit more than ever and it will remind us of the Christ that brought it to the world," said Adjutant Cox.

TRAINING CENTER SLATED AT BOISE

Camp White—(Spl.)—Establishment of a new Army Training Center to provide basic and certain special training for officers and enlisted men destined for Service Command units, was announced today by Headquarters, Camp White.

The center will be located at Boise Barracks, Idaho. Three companies of officers and enlisted men will staff it. Personnel necessary to provide a minimum staff of instructors, company headquarters, and training personnel for the first course, will be drawn from posts and camps in the Ninth Service Command.

Whenever practicable, such officers and enlisted men will be returned to their original units, or replaced, upon completion of the initial classes.

All posts, camps and stations will benefit from the training center, since it will relieve such establishments of the need for continuous basic training programs such as are required at present, when men are received

direct from reception centers. It will reduce and, in time, eliminate requisitions to provide personnel for other installations; it will provide for greater stabilization of personnel within posts; and it will provide an available supply of basically trained men ready to start work at once as replacements throughout the Service Command.
