3,500,000 WOMEN GAIN ADMISSION TO LABOR UNIONS

Resistance To Sex As Co-Workers Disappearing Under War-Time Needs.

Washington (U.P.)—About 3,500,000 women belong to trade unions today, according to the women's bureau of the Department of Labor.

"Where trade-union resistance to women as co-workers and co-members has existed, this is disappearing," according to Mary Anderson, director of the women's bureau. "It was based largely on men's fear of replacement by lower-paid women. The use of women as cheaper labor is not the fault of women but of a tradition that must be uprooted and cast out for the good of all."

Some groups have gone on record to take women into their unions, and have even voted in favor of equal-pay-for-equal-work resolutions. Some labor union that have advocated this principle are the United Automobile, Aircraft, and Agricultural Implement Workers of America; the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America; the Amalgamated Association of Street Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees; the Los Angeles council, and the national council of the National Maritime Union.

In San Francisco women welders in the shipbuilding industries were for a time refused clearance by the A.F. of L. Boilermakers' Union to work at Sausalito yards of Marinship because of lack of "proper facilities."

Issues Ultimatum
Because of the shortage of labor William Hopkins, regional west-coast director of the War Manpower Commission, issued an ultimatum that women must be employed to help build ships. Women are now being granted work permits, and all women welders in the Kaiser shipyards are now being admitted to the union.

The government has favored equal pay rates for both men and women for some time, as evidenced by announcements by the labor, war, and navy departments. So does the National Association of Manufacturers.

"However," Miss Anderson said, "much missionary work re-

mains to be done to get this principle firmly woven into the nation's economic fabric. I believe the individual labor unions are a very potent force to help effect this."

Elizabeth Christman of the women's bureau calls attention to the fact "that equality of opportunity must have meaning for women in the shop. Women must carry their full share of the load—do more than pay dues—serve on grievance committees, negotiate wage contracts, work at labor-management committees wherever they are set up."

Leaders Admit Disinterest
Several women are serving on labor-management committees in the West Coast war industries, according to the women's bureau.

Some labor leaders admit it is hard to get women interested in unions because women workers are making more money in war industry than they ever have before in all their life. They see little or no need for unions because they are satisfied with their jobs "as is." Often, too, women have not felt welcome in their unions, and have not taken an active part in union meetings.

In New York a school to train women for leadership in trade unions has been formed under the direction of the New York Industrial Union Council of the CIO. The school has two objectives: to supply women to replace men entering the services, and to encourage women to take part in union activities in proportion to their numbers in industry.

Some unions report a sizable number of their membership is female. For example, the membership of the National Union of General and Municipal Workers was 685,426 in June, 1942. Of this total, 216,000, or 32 per cent, were women.

86-YEAR-OLD DAD WORKS IN PLANT

Pittsburgh (U.P.)—Life may begin at 40 for some people, but for William H. McClintock—"Dad" to his friends and relatives—86 is a good time to start out, too.

"Dad" has a job in a McKees Rocks defense plant, doing his little bit in the war effort. An expert machinist, he works alongside his two sons and a grandson. Furthermore, he does as good a job as any of them.

"Dad" retired 12 years ago, and had been taking things easy on an old-age assistance pension. But when the war began, he be-

gan to feel as though he weren't doing his part.

"I wanted to do something," he said. "I'm too good a man yet not to work for my own living."

Bostonians Eager For Horse Steaks
Boston, Dec. 11.—(U.P.)—"Sold out" signs were posted today by Boston's only wholesale dealer in horse meat.

Manager David Mades of the Clinton Beef Co., which pioneered in the sale of horse meat here reported that his original consignment of 30,000 pounds was exhausted in 48 hours but that he expected another 30,000 pounds Friday or Saturday.

Mades predicted that prejudice against horse meat would disappear.
