PAIN

WOMEN URGED TO REGISTER UNDER BANNER OF "VRV"

Victory Recreation Volunteers Will be Formed to Help Entertain at Camp.

All women in the community are urged to register under the Victory Recreation Volunteers, a group which will aid with recreation at Camp White. The women, to be known as the VRV's are asked to specify the day or days they can serve in this recreational capacity when they make application at the chamber of commerce office with the civilian defense. There are no qualifications necessary except that those registering be over 18 years of age, it was explained.

The VRV campaign is being sponsored by the Jackson County Recreation committee in an effort to help solve the problem of recreational assistants at Camp White recreation centers. Registry of work, organizational, social, religious and fraternal groups is suggested and cards will be distributed through these centers for registration of members. Those not affiliated with such centers may register at the chamber of commerce. It was explained that present hostesses need not register but that registration is necessary in order to secure transportation.

Those having any questions may contact Mrs. Marjorie Pena at the Outpost. No hostess training is necessary. Mrs. Kinney Holmes was recently appointed chairman of the VRV's and it is hoped that a large group will signify their intention of assisting in this vitally needed project.

A study of the necessity of enlisting women for recreation at Camp White was made recently by a sub-committee of local residents working with the Jackson County Coordinating committee. Their findings showed that Medford's own recreational job will eventually make it impossible for local units of recreation to curtail their program so that Camp White's program can be maintained efficiently. This resulted in the beginning of VRV campaign.

Entertainment for soldiers at Camp White is well controlled, and fine facilities and music are offered. Older girls and mothers are also urged to join in the campaign and contribute to the fun and social events at camp. Soldiers' wives are invited to join the project also. It is not necessary for those registering to be able to dance as many activities do not call for this form of entertainment.

USE MAIN P. O. FOR CHRISTMAS MAIL

The public was asked today by Postmaster Frank DeSouza to use the main postoffice as much as possible for mailing parcels, instead of the sub-station on North Bartlett street. Provisions have been made at the main postoffice for speeding the handling of parcels, through a weighing booth installed at the west end of the lobby, he said. Here, parcels will be weighed and rated and then may be taken to the windows for stamps and dispatching.

Facilities at the sub-station can handle only a limited amount of parcel post letters for registry and persons are asked to use the main office for this service, the postmaster stated.

Missing him most are his owners, Mr. and Mrs. Flynn, who say that the dog always was kept in his five-foot high fenced pen, and never bothered anyone, the neighbors who used to stop often at the Flynn home to watch Toby caper with his pal, Mickey, a toy Boston bull, and the school children who used to feed Toby part of their lunch and other snacks. Mickey misses him too and wanders about his pen wondering what has happened to his playmate.

Toby would have been 10 years old in March and the Flynn's have had Toby with them for the past six years. He won his blue ribbon in a Los Angeles dog show and also has pedigree of which any dog could be rightfully proud.

The Flynn's said today that the only thing that probably saved Mickey's life was the fact that Mickey would only eat food that was given him by his owners while Toby, being a bit more on the greedy side, ate anything.

After being fed Mickey and Toby always liked a romp in their pen with their master. The last time Toby enjoyed his romp was Friday, December 8 for the next morning Toby was found dead.

Mr. Flynn has offered \$100 reward for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who poisoned his dog.
