

SHOW PRODUCERS GIVEN SENTENCE

New York, Dec. 17.—(U.P.)—Judge Owen W. Bohan today imposed a six-months penitentiary sentence on Isidore H. Herk, co-producer of the revue "Wine, Women and Song," which a jury had found to be an "obscene, indecent, immoral and impure exhibition," and gave suspended to two of his associates, Samuel Funt, company manager, and Herman Shapiro, stage manager.

The judge in imposing sentence criticized persons who present public exhibitions "intended to excite the passions inordinately or degrade the dignity of women."

LOMBARDI LEADS SENIOR BATTERS

New York, Dec. 17.—(U.P.)—Big Ernie Lombardi, 230-pound catcher of the Boston Braves, who slid down the baseball ladder quickly after committing a classic world series lapse in 1939, surged back just as fast last season to earn the National League batting championship for the second time in his 12-year Major League career.

Lombardi fell on his back in the midst of a New York Yankees rally that scored three runs to defeat Cincinnati in the deciding series game and was traded to Boston this year after he had slipped to .264 in '41—lowest average of his career. But he came back in 1942 to fashion the league's best mark, .330 in 105 games, official National League batting averages disclosed today.
