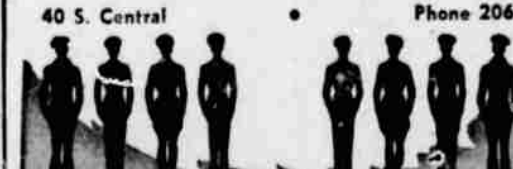

TIRE APPLICANT RECORD REQUIRED

Tire applicants must accompany their application to the war price and rationing board with the "B" section of their tire inspection record, board members stated today. All residents of the county were reminded that tires must be inspected before Jan. 31. Board members suggested that drivers do not wait until the last few days for this routine check-up but do it between now and the deadline in order not to swamp service stations with inspection of their tires.

Those with commercial cars operating under the certificate of war necessity must have their tires inspected every 60 days or each 5,000 miles, depending on which comes first.

CHILDREN HELPED IN 1942 HARVESTS ON MANY FRONTS

Girls and Boys Busy Past Summer is Word Following Nation-Wide Survey.

Washington (AP)—With the close of the grape season in western New York, this year marked the first time since the World War that school children have been widely used as a source of farm labor.

Students and faculty of the Fredonia Normal school in New York turned out en masse during the apple season to harvest the fruit.

High school students of Manassas, Va., harvested the uncut hay and corn of Fairfax county, Virginia.

Scores of Washington, D. C., high school boys worked throughout the summer on farms in Montgomery county, Md.

High school girls working with the American Women's Volunteer services hired out as farm hands in California during the summer.

South Not Hit So Hard
And Texas and Florida school children still have farm work ahead of them in the winter months, although the adult labor shortage has not been so serious in the south as in New England, New York, New Jersey, the west coast and the western sugar beet states.

Farm labor has been drained off the farms in every part of the country where war industries are concentrated. Several months ago representatives of the children's bureau of the Department of Labor, the Department of Agriculture, the Office of Education and the U. S. Employment service held a conference in Washington to consider the possibility of using children on farms.

Fair labor standards were set up by this group to insure children again exploitation. As a result, thousands of children 14 years of age and over were used in various localities throughout the country to pick berries, peaches, apples, tomatoes and grapes.

New York had a state-wide program, which was passed by the legislature last year. It allows children over 14 years of age on farms 30 school days a year, providing they do not work more than 15 days at one time. The children of the state are mobilized into "the cadet victory service," and are given a chance to work on day hauls, live on farms, or in work camps. According to the children's bureau, the first method of using children—on the day-to-day basis—was most widely used. In the Buffalo, Dunkirk, Jamestown, N. Y., and Erie, Pa., areas, where the labor shortage is extreme, the U. S. Employment Service broadcast appeals each day for help. A few adults and many children reported early the next day, and worked day-to-day shifts on surrounding farms. One difficulty arose: farmers were used to paying their help at the end of the season, and these workers had to be paid each day. Farmers often were caught short without change.

Lived With Farmers
In Montgomery county, Maryland, a group of Washington school boys lived all summer on neighboring farms. They received some instruction in school before they were sent out to work. Some of them became good farmers during the vacation.

A number of New York City boys of high school age were housed in work camps in the Hudson Valley this summer, and

gathered fruit for farmers with insufficient labor.

The best project was that carried on by the Fredonia normal school near Buffalo. The faculty and students spent 10 days picking fruit. There was a canteen and nursing service attached to the group, and the dean of women and a corps of assistants acted as counselors to iron out any difficulties. Farmers considered the help of this group excellent.

In Manassas, Va., the agricultural instructor paired off city and farm children in teams, nominating an agricultural student as leader of each unit. This method proved highly satisfactory.

From the experience government and school authorities had with children as farm hands this summer they learned that there should be a careful selection of young workers, who are physically enough developed to stand up under the strain of long hours of work. There were many accidents with pickforks, this summer that might be eliminated if careful instruction is given children before they start work. Farmers have to guarantee safe transportation. It is necessary for them to carry liability insurance in New York, a law which federal officials endorse for all.

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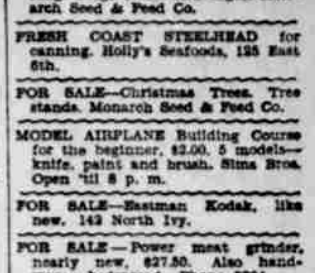
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
