First Vesper Program Will Present Mrs. Robert F. Muller-New York Soprano

Members of the First Presbyterian church are opening their auditorium for a social entertainment for officers and men of Camp White by sponsoring a series of Sunday vesper musicales during the winter months. A lyric soprano from Long Island, N. Y., Mrs. Muller is well-known in New York music circles. She has studied under Raymond Hunter of Carnegie Hall and appeared in recital at Steinway hall as soloist with Wesley Sontags Symphonetta and was the leading soprano for two years with the Mask and Lyric Light Opera company.

She will be accompanied at the console of the organ and piano by Mrs. Verl O. Felling, church organist, who is well-known in southern Oregon music circles.

JAMES C. STELLE FIRST REGISTERED UNDER NEW DRAFT

Registration of all youths born between September 1, 1924, and October 31, 1924, will continue through December 24. The selective service office in the city hall is open for registration from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. each day with the exception of Tuesday when it remains open until

7 p. m. Other registration places are available throughout the county. Selective service board members urged a complete registration of youths born during the above mentioned months.

PENNIES, NICKELS LEAVE HIDING FOR WARTIME SERVICE

Washington, Dec. 18.—(U.P.)—Pennies and nickels are pouring out of hiding by the thousand and by the pound as the treasury presses its coin circulation campaign to save metal.

Reports compiled at the mint today disclosed that piggy banks, whiskey jugs and even an antique charcoal-burning flatiron have disgorged their coin hoards since the campaign began a month ago.

Meanwhile the treasury is ready to begin coining pennies and a new three-cent piece out of zinc-coated steel as soon as the president signs the new coinage bill passed by Congress Wednesday. The steel base will be used because of the acute shortage of copper.

The champion coin collector revealed since the "bring-out-the-coin campaign" started is Assistant Professor of Finance J. Ellwood Amos of the University of Pittsburgh. Enlisting his economic students, Amos has brought back into circulation to date more than 1,000,000 pennies, weighing three quarters of a ton. His freshman class counted 500,000 of them without losing one.

BODY OF DREW IS FOUND IN ROGUE

The body of John R. Drew, 47, who met death by drowning near the highway bridge across Rogue river at Gold Hill on November 29, was recovered yesterday evening near the place where he was supposed to have ended the water.

The body was found floating and was brought ashore by M. W. Schmidt, resident living near by. Deputy Coroner C. W. Morris and state police went for the remains upon word of the discovery.

Drew was born in Minnesota and had resided in Medford for four years.

He was a member of the Episcopal church and the Moose lodge.

Besides his wife, Eva Drew, he leaves one son, Robert Drew in the U. S. army. Also two brothers and one sister in Highmore, Minnesota.

Graveside services in the Sixtieth memorial park will be held at 11 a. m. Saturday with Rev. Herald G. Gardner officiating. Conger Funeral Parlor in charge.

Menials Unavailable Despite Tempting Ads; War Industries Call

St. Louis.—(U.P.)—"Wanted: servant, good pay, will furnish good references, private room and bath in completely modern home."

The help wanted columns of St. Louis newspapers are growing in length with ardent appeals for domestic servants—good ones, bad or indifferent ones.

Appeals projected from as far as Chicago or Enid, Okla., have found their way into print here. All are baited with such tempting pleas as the one above.

But they are doomed to go unanswered, the employment agencies say, since the servant situation in St. Louis is as bad, if not worse, than any city in the nation. The agencies say that the war industries are attracting servants here just like any place else. Offers of as high as \$80 per month, including board and room, are going unheeded. Some householders will throw in a five-day week and carfare for a domestic to dust and make the beds.

The United States employment service has closed its domestic help department, and private agencies declare they are receiving 300 to 400 calls for help a month which they are unable to fill.

One private agency moaned that in September of last year he had hundreds of beginners listed in his files. In September of this year, only five remained. He placed those immediately, he said, but at the end of the first week, every one quit to take a job in war industries.

ERSATZ GARBAGE CANS
Vancouver, Wash.—(U.P.)—Priority problems in getting 5,000 garbage cans for a war housing project here recently didn't stump the housing authority for long. An initial order was placed for 1,000 ersatz "cans" which were made out of plywood and painted inside and out with acid-resisting paint. They were guaranteed by the manufacturer in Aberdeen, Wash., to outlast the metal receptacles.

MEDFORD AIRMAN LISTED MISSING RATION BOOK NO. 1 DEADLINE DELAYED TO JAN. 15, 1943

Word has been received here that Richard Muskopf, former Medford boy, is missing in routine army air maneuvers along the Pacific shoreline. His plane was last heard from the morning of December 8. He is a Tech. Sgt. in the U. S. army air force and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard F. Muskopf of Pelican City.

Muskopf graduated from Klamath Union High school and enlisted August 16, 1941, in the air corps. He was married February of this year and his wife, Mrs. Bonnie Muskopf, resides in Riverside, Cal.

Washington, Dec. 18.—(U.P.)—The Office of Price Administration has postponed until January 15, 1943, the final date for obtaining war ration book No. 1.

"Weather conditions, transportation problems and heavy work loads of many board offices all contributed to the difficulty of finishing registration by December 15, the deadline originally set, and an extension of time was needed," Paul M. O'Leary, deputy administrator in charge of rationing, said. O'Leary said that late applicants for ration book No. 1 were mostly those who take their meals out and who had no use for the first book while it was good only for buying sugar and coffee. Ration book No. 1 will be necessary to obtain ration ration book No. 2.

Local rationing board members stated today that they would follow the change in closing date of obtaining war ration books No. 1 and remain open for registration until January 15 in keeping with the Washington, D. C., request.

Board members also stated that industrial and institutional users of sugar may apply for their January and February allotments at the office. These allotments remain unchanged it was explained, 70 per cent for industrial users, 60 per cent for institutional users and 85 per cent for hospitals of the type which were entitled to receive this amount during the November-December period.
