The first draft registration for 18-year-olds was held recently and to Donald Milton Bowers of 24 Mistletoe street went the honor of being the number one Medford boy to sign up for possible induction into your Uncle Samuel's armed forces. Bowers, who is 18, is a student and at present is assistant manager of the shoe department of the J. C. Penney company.

Board number two, embracing the territory outside Medford, reported that Donald Eugene Wolff of Route 1, Box 935, Central Point, was the first to register. At present he is helping his father on their farm.

So, congratulations to the two Donalds, for being first in registering for selective service. First, that is, for the 18-year-olds in this area.

Along the sports front the most newsworthy item of the past week was the announcement that Norman Worthley, popular and capable athletic coach of junior high school, had enlisted in the U. S. navy's physical education program headed by Gene Tunney, former world's heavyweight boxing champ.

Worthley, who also is a grand baseball player, received a chief petty officer's rating. He'll leave here Dec. 30 to report to Norfolk, Va., Jan. 13, for his six-weeks training course. After that—well, his fate is in the hands of the navy department.

He will be succeeded by George Harrington, who used to coach at junior high before resigning to take a position in the local fruit industry.

A four-team hockey league has been organized, with players drawn from the thousands of soldiers stationed at Camp White, and the schedule will open tomorrow night in the fine Medford Ice Arena with the 1st Infantry Division's Artillery Gunners facing the USO Bombers.

Basketball will make its 1942-43 debut here tonight when Medford high plays Weed (Cal.) high. The Tigers are looking very good and are expected to measure the invading Californians, although little is known regarding the strength of the latter outfit.

Instead of the usual two-week Christmas holiday, Medford students will enjoy only four days' respite from studies this year. School will be dismissed the afternoon of Dec. 23 and take up again Dec. 28. The reason for the shortened vacation period is that school opened at a late date in the fall so students could aid in the fruit harvest.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Flynn aren't very happy these days, for somebody poisoned their dog, Toby, blue-ribbon English bull who never bothered anyone. Almost 10 years old, Toby had been with the Flynns for the past six years. Tom has offered \$100 reward for arrest and conviction of the poisoner, and it is sincerely hoped events lead to the payment of that reward.

War has temporarily halted the political career of Frank J. VanDyke of Ashland. Elected to the Oregon house of representatives in the last election, Frank will be unable to serve during the coming session because he is attending Officer's Candidate School at Camp Roberts, Cal. The county court will appoint somebody to serve in his place.

Also attending Officer's Candidate School at Camp Roberts is Russell Brown, captain of the 1934 Medford high football team coached by Darwin Burgher. Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Brown of 737 West Jackson boulevard, enlisted in the army in October of this year and is attached to Co. A, 86th Infantry. After his graduation from Medford high Russ went to Linfield college.

We, in Medford, have received word of the promotions of several local men in the armed forces. Stephen A. Nye, Medford fruit grower, has been promoted from captain to major. He is stationed at the New Orleans (La.) Port of Embarkation, motor transport division.

Also promoted in rank recently was Maj. Nye's brother-in-law, Lowell I. Dew, now a lieutenant

commander in the U. S. naval air forces. Lt. Cmdr. Dew, a 1929 graduate of Medford high and later of the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, is stationed at Trinidad, British West Indies.

Promoted from corporal to sergeant was Gene W. Tedrick of Route 4. He is stationed at Camp Forrest, Tenn., with Hq. Co. 3rd Bn., 319th Infantry.

Max Peirce, Medford insurance man has been commissioned a lieutenant, senior grade, in the navy air forces and has left for Quonset Point (R. I.) Naval Air Station to undergo training.

Robert Von der Hellen, an aviation cadet, is in training at the Santa Anna (Cal.) army flying school and Bob Hollenbeck has left for Ft. Lewis (Wash.) to join the army air corps.

Woodrow W. Shaver was commissioned a second lieutenant upon his graduation from the chemical warfare service Officer's Candidate School at Edgewood Arsenal, Md.

Also completing various forms of training were Aviation Cadets Jack F. Keaveny and Donald F. Grigsby at the San Antonio (Tex.) aviation cadet center and Pts. Alfred C. Totty and Earl Reitsma from the aviation mechanics course at Shepherd Field (Tex.).

Delbert Burke, former speech and debate coach at Medford high, is now a first lieutenant in the U. S. Marine Corps and is instructing fliers at Kingsville, Tex.

Pvt. George Lawless, inducted recently, has been assigned for training to the medical replacement training center at Camp Robinson, Ark.

Shelby G. Tuttle is stationed at the San Antonio (Tex.) aviation cadet center, pre-flight school; Pvt. James F. Lewis is at Camp Polk, La., with an armored division and Orville V. Wilson, pharmacist's mate, third class, is at the U. S. naval hospital in Seattle, Wash.

Among local boys overseas are Corp. J. S. Humphries, with the army air forces in Africa, and his brother, Corp. Tommie Humphries, with the army air forces in England, at last report.

Spending furloughs here the past week were Thomas Kearney, boatswain's mate, stationed at Keyport, Wash.; Sgt. Keith R. Shull, who is en route to Baton Rouge, La., from Alaska, with a fighter squadron, and Pfc. August Singler, in the army signal corps at Camp Crowder.
