

BOMBERS DEFEAT ARTILLERY 8 TO 1 IN HOCKEY MATCH

With Clarence (Mark) Marquess ramming home four unassisted goals, the USO Bombers defeated the 91st Artillery Gunners, 8 to 1, in the opening game of the newly-formed four-team ice hockey league at the Medford Ice Arena last night.

Aiding Marquess, the Ashland high school flash, in the Bomber victory was Pvt. Warren Childers, who scored three times, and McCollum, who made one goal.

The lone tally for the Gunners came in the second period, with Pvt. J. Werderber scoring on an assist from Pvt. A. Morana. The Bombers were held to a single goal in the first heat, but opened up to score four times in the second quarter and thrice in the final 15 minutes.

CALIFORNIA FIVE DOWNS NAVY BASE

Berkeley, Cal., Dec. 19.—California's Golden Bears chalked up an easy victory 48 to 32 basketball victory over the Oakland naval air base quintet here tonight in a rough-and-tumble game that saw 37 personal fouls called.

The Bears, leading all the way, piled up a 23-18 halftime margin and stretched their edge in the second half behind the sharpshooting of Sophomore Forward Chuck Hanger, who scored 10 points.

Navy Forward Ed Loomis, former St. Mary's star, captured high scoring honors, however, with 12 points.

The air base's topnotch forward, Bob Doll, former all-America from University of Colorado, was ejected from the game in the second period on four personal fouls.

DE PAUL DEFEATS TROJANS 49-47

The Trojans challenged strongly in their second half after trailing by 10 points at the intermission. Gene Rock, USC forward, scored 20 points.

UCLANS EKE OUT WIN OVER DONS

Los Angeles Dec. 19.—University of California at Los Angeles defeated San Francisco university 39 to 37 in a closely fought basketball game here tonight.

The victory gave UCLA the two-game series, the Bruins having downed the Dons 41-30 last night.

The Bruins had a 13-7 lead midway in the first period after Marvin Lee, lanky UCLA center, popped two field goals, but the Dons quickly tied it up 13-13 and went into the lead 17-18. In the last 12 seconds of the period, Capt. John Fryer, Bruin guard, pitched one from the center to end the half 18-17.

The Dons immediately took over 21-18 as the second period opened and the game saw-sawed back and forth until the Bruins finally polished it off.

PURDUE BEATEN BY NOTRE DAME

South Bend, Ind., Dec. 19.—Notre Dame stood off a terrific Purdue rally to chalk up its fifth straight victory, 46 to 43, before a capacity crowd of 4,800 tonight. It was Purdue's second defeat in four starts, Notre Dame's third victory in last four starts with the Boilermakers.

Purdue got off to a 9 to 4 lead, but didn't score a field goal in the final 13 minutes of the

first half, while the Irish moved to a 9-all tie and 22 to 12 at half-time.

Second half also started slowly, Notre Dame going ahead, 28 to 17, after 5 minutes. Here the Boilermakers launched a surge to tie the score at 30-all in 4 minutes.

OLD ALARM CLOCK AT FANCY PRICE

Los Angeles, Dec. 19.—A second hand alarm clock is now selling for \$4 to \$5 and new clocks are virtually unobtainable here.

Thousands of defense workers have cleaned out local stocks and many merchants reported they had had no clocks for three to six months.

A canvass of pawn shops revealed that the few used sleep-wreckers available were bringing fabulous prices. One second hand, somewhat battered pink boudoir alarm clock was priced at \$8.50. Lowest figure quoted by a skid-row shop was \$2.50.

Stanford University, Cal., Dec. 19.—Coach Everett Dean tonight announced the traveling squad for the Stanford basketball team's trip to New Orleans, where the Indians tangle with the Great Lakes Naval Training Station quintet in part of the annual New Orleans mid-winter sports show. The proceeds of the game go to navy relief.

WAR BENEFITS
San Francisco, Dec. 19.—Families of men killed in action with the heroic U. S. cruiser San Francisco will receive a total of \$10,000 from the proceeds of the San Francisco Chronicle's benefit prize fight card last Monday, the newspaper announced tonight.

DUTCH AIR SCHOOL AT JACKSON, MISS., BRINGS COLONISTS

Jackson, Miss.—(U.P.)—Jackson was settled by mericans, but it rapidly is becoming a Dutch colony.

It all started with the establishment of the Netherlands Royal air force training school here, but since then many refugees from Dutch cities in Java have made their homes in Mississippi's capital city.

The presence of the flying Dutchmen and their families provided the nucleus for the settlement, which recently has been visited by the Queen and Princess Juliana of the Netherlands. Prince Bernhard, consort of Juliana and commander-in-chief of the Netherlands' air men, has also been here to encourage the flyers now training for their return bout with the Japs.

Those fortunate enough to escape with their families have rented houses and are fitting themselves into the social life of Jackson.

"The children have no toys to play with," one of the Dutch neighbors said. "We left everything except the clothes we wore when we heard the Japanese were coming. Nothing matters, though, as long as we are all together."

Many Javanese were among the Dutch Eas Indians. "They are of the highest caste," the commanding officer said. "One of their number is the son of a rajah, and is claimed to be the richest boy in the world. Many others are members of families of sultans and immensely wealthy Javanese."

Though training to fight, the Dutch are a peaceful race. When an officer was asked if he would be glad to bomb Japanese cities as they had bombed his, he said: "Yes, if it is necessary to win the war—otherwise, no. Innocent people would suffer. We are Christians. The Japanese are barbarians."
