NATIVITY PAGEANT THIS EVENING AT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Continuing the tradition of several years Saint Mark's Episcopal church will present tonight at 7:30 o'clock the Pageant of the Holy Nativity. Sixty characters are required, including boys and girls and adults, all appropriately costumed. Special lighting is used as well as physical properties which transform the church into a replica of the birthplace of the Lord Jesus. The musical continuity is provided by an angel choir of twenty girls' voices.

Divided into five scenes the pageant chronicles the complete nativity story beginning with the crowding of the Inn by the Roman soldiers, the assignment of Mary and Joseph to the stable, a musical interpretation of the Holy birth, the coming of the shepherds and three kings with their attendants, leading to a climax of the whole assemblage in humble worship before the creche.

Parents, friends and strangers are given a cordial welcome to this service which will be held in the enlarged church for the first time. There should be room for all.

Immediately following the pageant everyone in attendance will be invited to the Parish House for the Christmas party at which a program will be given by the kindergarten department and the visit of Santa Claus with treats anticipated. Service men and families are given a particular welcome.
