Normal Nerve Function

The home hospitality committees of the USO and Outpost have an invitation form in the Mail Tribune daily for the convenience of local and nearby community citizens to use in asking a soldier to their home for Christmas dinner. To date response has been limited and passes from Camp White for soldiers to attend local functions must be secured one to two days ahead so citizens who are depending upon last minute invitations may be disappointed, it was stated.

Boys May Register In Home Community For Draft Service

All youths born between September 1 and October 31, 1924, are required to register for military service before next Thursday evening.

In order to conserve gasoline and rubber, provisions have been made for those residing at Prospect, Trail, Butte Falls, Eagle Point, Gold Hill, Rogue River, Phoenix, Talent and the Applegate to register Tuesday in their home communities, and thus save a trip to Medford.

If they are unable to register Tuesday they can be registered at the Selective Service board room in the City hall, before Thursday evening. The law requires all males born between the above dates to do so.

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San Francisco And Los Angeles Lead In Divorce Column

Los Angeles, Dec. 21.—(UP)—San Francisco and Los Angeles lead the nation for homes broken by divorce, Dr. Paul Popenoe, director of the American Institute of Family Relations said today.

Dr. Popenoe released figures showing that one out of every five children in Los Angeles comes from a home in which parents have been separated by divorce.

By contrast, he said, in greater New York, only one child in 20 has divorced parents.

San Francisco and Los Angeles are tied with the largest proportion of divorces—4.1 per cent of the white males and 5.8 per cent of the females over 15—the institute director reported.

Fewest divorced men and women are found in Philadelphia, where the ratio is less than one per cent. Washington, D. C., is the only other large city with a percentage approaching the high mark of California's two leading cities, Dr. Popenoe said.

PLENTY WHISKY FOR YULE CHEER

Washington, Dec. 21.—(UP)—There will be plenty of whisky for Christmas cheer, New Year toasts and post-holiday tipping but dwindling stocks will change Americans' drinking habits before the war ends.

Total whisky supply in the hands of distillers is about 490,000,000 gallons or enough for a three-year period at the average annual rate of consumption. That does not mean that the entire stocks will be made available to consumers before 1946 if the war is still on.

Many states of that control the sale of liquor already have begun rationing. Others are expected to follow.

LUMBERMEN ELIGIBLE FOR BOOT PURCHASE

Washington, Dec. 21.—(UP)—The Office of Price Administration today ruled that lumbermen are eligible for ration certificates entitled them to buy laced rubber boots, previously reserved exclusively for miners. An additional supply of rubber has been allotted for production of rubber boots, OPA said.
