

NEW CLASSES IN HOME NURSING TO OPEN IN JANUARY

Women of County Offered Chance to Aid in Safeguarding Health at Home.

New classes in home nursing, conducted by the American Red Cross, are to start in January. Miss Helen Bullis, chairman of this volunteer service announces. Through these practical classes, which have been revised for wartime, Jackson county women have an opportunity to form the first line of defense in safeguarding the health and happiness of their homes and community and hence of the nation.

Mothers of the Oak Grove school will sponsor a class, with Mrs. Henry Padgham as instructor, open to anyone who can reach the district.

Lincoln School Class. Another class will be conducted at the Lincoln school two days a week from 1:30 until 3:30 p. m.

It is hoped that someone will offer their home for another class in Medford. As the course is planned to meet family needs in the home in caring for the sick, it is felt this would be the logical place to teach the course.

A class of 25 high school girls, with Mrs. Hayes as instructor, are taking the course in Phoenix high school. It is anticipated such a class may be organized in Medford high school if an instructor can be secured. Phoenix residents plan to have a class for adults soon.

With Mrs. Allan Perry, Mrs. Clyde Richmond, Mrs. Gretchen Meehan and Mrs. Celeste Cowles as instructors, 40 Medford women have just completed the course, which included one evening class. Mrs. Vernon Johnson taught a class at Eagle Point, where 19 secured certificates.

In home nursing classes now being conducted, 89 women are taking the 30-hour course. These include Central Point, 23, with Mrs. Woodhall as instructor; Shady Cove, 11, Mrs. Ursula Burgess; Phoenix, 25 high school girls, with Mrs. Hayes; Rogue River, 15, Mrs. Agnes Magaric; Ashland, Mrs. Frazier, with 15.

For the first three months of 1943 the quota of home nursing members has been set at 87,000 for the northwest, although Jackson county has not received any definite figures as to the amount of this quota to be filled here.

Any woman interested in taking this very practical course, so beneficial in caring for illness in the home during this emergency, with so many doctors and nurses serving the armed forces, is urged to contact the Red Cross office in the court house, telephone 4405, for further particulars or to register for new classes starting in January, which may include an evening class if there is sufficient demand. The only expense involved is the cost of the text book, which is 60c. In many instances one book is shared by several women.

WAR BOND SALE OUTLOOK BRIGHT

Portland, Dec. 23.—(U.P.)—The response of 28,000,000 Americans to the voluntary payroll deduction plan of purchasing war bonds has probably eliminated the need for a government-enforced savings plan, local war savings officials said today after a conference with Robert W. Coyne, national field director for the treasury department's war savings staff.

Coyne told officials from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana that the outlook for war revenue from war bond sales in 1943 was particularly encouraging. Indications are, he said, that sales will reach some \$8,500,000,000 in "E" bonds alone.

BLOOD DISEASE TAKES FAMOUS NEGRO RUNNER
