TIRE MEN TO HEAR O.P.A. EXPERTS AT MEETING TONIGHT

R. B. Reynolds, OPA state tire rationing representative, will be in charge of the meeting called by Hobart Price, executive secretary of the Medford rationing board.

Mileage rationing regulations will be explained by Frank Senn, OPA district mileage rationing representative, and James Hedrick, OPA state tire examiner, will tell how to make proper tire inspections before certifying new tires or recaps for use. An explanation of OPA forms will be made before the meeting is thrown open for questions.
