HAWAII TO REGAIN PART OF RIGHTS. Washington, Dec. 25.—(U.P.)—A high official of the interior department charged today that the military has "violated every guarantee of the bill of rights" in Hawaii "except possibly that of free worship."

He made the charge as other official sources predicted that Hawaii, under martial law since Dec. 7, 1941, will be returned to partial civilian rule soon after Jan. 1.

The interior department official said he was doing everything he could to assure a full return to civilian administration of the courts and the policing of the islands. He asked that his name not be used.

RAMIE GROWERS SEEK INVENTION TO SHRED FIBER

Giant Parachutes Possible When Method Found—Great Tensile Strength.

Tallahassee, Fla. (U.P.)—Giant parachutes capable of lowering whole companies of armed men behind enemy lines would be feasible in the near future except for one difficulty, Florida agricultural department officials pointed out.

That difficulty lies in the inability to date to devise a practical machine for mass-shredding of boehmeria nives fibers.

Boehmeria nives, commonly known as ramie, was used for cloth-making in ancient China. It has been grown in Florida and several southern states for a number of years.

Commissioner of Agriculture Nathan Mayo predicted that when ramie can be shredded, many scientific discoveries would be the natural outcome and American industry would greatly benefit.

Because ramie has greater tensile strength than any known fiber and because its elasticity and torsion qualities are surpassed only by raw silk, textile experts foresee an interesting future for the unimposing nettle plant which produces it.

Spent Half-Million. Usable ramie fibers range from half an inch to 20 inches in length. The average is six to eight inches—longer than any fiber utilized in textile or cordage mills.

DuPont chemical interests and private investors have spent over a half-million dollars trying to exploit ramie. Their efforts to date have been in vain. But with war-born shortages pushing scientists to new and ever greater goals, the answer may not be far away.

Commissioner Mayo said that two machines now ready for testing give promise of solving the ramie bottle-neck.

Besides its uses in fabrics, ramie furnishes high-quality cellulose which can be used in making paper. Ramie fiber could be used in auto tire casings, for belting and other products which perform heavy-duty work.

One clothing authority has commented that a suit made of ramie would outlast two generations of wearers—from father to son and perhaps to grandson.

Crop In Everglades. In Florida ramie is being grown at the Belgrade state experiment station. An experimental crop has been planted in the Everglades. Since the weed-like plant grows well in rich, mucky soil, this experiment should prove fruitful.

Another significant thing about ramie is its ability to produce from two to four crops a year for a period of 10 years or more under favorable conditions. When one crop is harvested another starts growing from the roots of the first.

The yield of ramie stalks in China has been reported from 400 to 700 pounds of prepared grass per acre. In this country yields from one to 45 tons of green stalks and leaves per acre have been recorded.

Because its bark contains tannic acid, ramie is not attacked by insects. It grows well in sections where there is not too great a variation in seasonal temperatures and where the plant is given protection from severe cold.

The possibilities of ramie are great, but until another Eli Whitney comes along to put this industry on a profitable basis, it must lie dormant. Only in Japan and China, where labor is cheap, has it been developed.
