KAISER'S CHARGE OF PREJUDICE TO BE AIDED MONDAY.

Washington, Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—The National Labor Relations board tonight subpoenaed Paul R. Porter, of the War Production board, and Daniel S. Ring, of the maritime commission, to appear Monday for questioning in connection with a charge that two of the three NLRB members are prejudiced against the Henry J. Kaiser shipbuilding interests.

At the same time, the NLRB gave the Kaiser interests until December 30 to substantiate their claims. Complete affidavits had been due today.

The Oregon Shipbuilding Corp. and the Kaiser Co., Inc. filed a motion on December 7 to disqualify the board from acting on C. I. O. charges that three Kaiser shipyards had signed illegal closed-shop contracts with A. F. L. unions. They claimed that Chairman H. A. Mills and member Regard Reilly had already decided the Kaiser firms were guilty of violating the national labor relations act, and maintained the case should be settled by the War Labor board.

The NLRB asked the Kaiser firms to support their assertions and to obtain statements from Porter, Ring and other men who were present at a meeting where allegedly prejudicial statements were made.

CONGRESS TO FACE FIGHT OVER DRAFT OF MEN, WOMEN

Sen. Austin Plans Manpower Bill—Waste Now Prevails—Need Cited.

Washington, Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—Sen. Warren R. Austin, R. Vt., insisting that voluntary methods of solving the nation's critical manpower problems will never work, said tonight he will press for early enactment of a national service act to permit drafting of men and women for war work.

Austin who introduced a "work or fight" bill during the last session of congress, predicted that the campaign for a national service law will touch off one of the most heated controversies to come up during the new congress. Such legislation, he said, is bitterly opposed by some members of congress who look upon it as authorizing "involuntary servitude."

Declaring flatly that "while we in America have performed many miracles since the beginning of the war, voluntary methods of solving the manpower problems have not and can not work," Austin said in an interview that a "waste of manpower" already is prevalent in many war industries, including ship building.

The proposed legislation drafted by Clark and submitted to the war manpower commission declares that "an obligation rests upon every person to render such personal service in aid of the war effort as he or she may be deemed best fitted to perform." It provides for registration of men from 18 to 65 years, and of women from 18 to 50 years of age.

The President would be authorized to assign persons to any war work, "including the production of war materials of every sort, transportation and agriculture, and training for the performance of all such work."

Hollywood, Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—In a marriage so exclusive even the actress' studio publicity staff was barred, Film Star Ann Rutherford and David May, department store executive, were wed at sundown in the home of the bridegroom's parents.

The studio said the list of those invited did not contain any Hollywood actors or actresses.

The dark-haired bride, whose age was listed as 23, is the daughter of Mrs. John Dufferin Rutherford, a former film actress.

The pair will spend their honeymoon in Phoenix, Ariz., and then will go to New York on a combined business and pleasure trip.

Miss Rutherford was born in Toronto, Canada, and moved to Hollywood at the age of 11. Her father was well known in the Metropolitan Opera company. She first entered radio work but later was given her chance on the screen when a studio executive heard her on the air and requested a screen test.

She first made her name as Polly Benedict in the "Andy Hardy" series, starring Mickey Rooney.

She is on a month's leave from 20th Century-Fox and will resume work on the couple's return from the east.

Prineville, Ore., Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. William Beach, both about 40, were found today at their smash ed automobile 80 feet below the rim of an embankment skirting a rutted logging road 15 miles north of here.

Police said the car was climbing a steep hill and apparently was pitched over the embankment when it struck deep ruts in the road.

The accident occurred late last night as the couple drove back toward their home at the saw mill camp, their car laden with Christmas packages.

SPORTS ROSE BOWL GAME TO DRAW 93,000 GEORGIA FAVORED

Ticketh Sales Zoom—Sell-out Predicted—Sinkwich Ankles Better.

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—The Rose Bowl ticket market was reported booming tonight for the first time since the army gave the annual gridiron classic the green light last month.

A capacity throng of 93,000 was forecast by William C. Ackerman, graduate manager of UCLA, and Earl Mann, in charge of Georgia ticket sales, because of the heavier demand.

Mann reported all of Georgia's allotted 4,000 tickets had been sold and Ackerman said UCLA's supply was dwindling. He indicated that he expected a sell-out by the closing time Monday.

UCLA will keep its ticket offices open Sunday.

Both Georgia and UCLA placed restrictions on ticket sales so far as mail requests were concerned. They filled only those which came from residents of the area.

Meanwhile, Trainer Doc Jones reported a decided improvement in Frankie Sinkwich's ankles and it appeared possible that the All-American backfield star may be able to resume light work-out Monday. He stayed at the hotel as Coach Wallace Butts sent the Bulldogs through a workout this morning at Tournament park.

A few of the Georgia players were suffering from slight colds, but Jones said their condition was nothing to worry about.

The Georgia group left after the workout for a tour of film studios in Hollywood.

After taking Christmas day off, UCLA went through its last heavy practice scrimmage with Coach Babe Horrell. He said he would devote the team's drills on Monday and Tuesday to defensive tactics.

Odds on the game continued to drop, with Georgia still the favorite. The latest quotations were 8 to 5 whereas the Bulldogs at one time were favored 3 to 1.
