

All-Stars Down Redskins, 17-14 in Professional "Bowl" Battle

LEE ARTOE BOOTS LONG FIELD GOAL FOR WIN MARGIN

Stars Tally Two Touchdowns in Second Half to Overcome Washington Lead.

Philadelphia, Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—The Washington Redskins still reigned as champions of the National Professional Football league today but their record was somewhat tarnished by a 17-14 loss to the league All-Stars in the post-season pro Bowl game.

Coach Hartley (Hunk) Anderson, co-pilot of the Chicago Bears and Lee Artoe, Bears' tackle, were the happiest men on the squad for both derived some measure of revenge for the 14-6 defeat their team suffered at the hands of the Redskins in the league's title play-off.

It was Anderson who coached the professional All-Stars to their triumph over the Redskins yesterday before 18,871 fans at Shibe Park and it was Artoe's artistic toe which provided the winning margin early in the fourth quarter with a 43-yard field goal that sailed squarely between the uprights.

At the start of the game, it looked as though the Redskins—playing without Sammy Baugh, who failed to make plane connections from his home at Rotan, Texas—would have things pretty much their own way as the All-Stars were unable to click with any combination of players.

Aldrich Scores
The hard-charging Redskins' line broke through frequently to throw the Stars for losses. Midway in the first period, Harry Hopp of the Detroit Lions kicked from his own 11. Ki Aldrich, Washington center, grabbed the ball off the ground on the 40 and raced unmolested for the score. Bob Mastersoh converted.

The other Redskin score came in the third. Roy Zimmerman who made a valiant bid to fill the Baugh's shoes, filled the air with passes. With the ball on the Stars' 45, he tossed to Mastersoh who carried to the 16. Two plays later, Zimmerman passed to Bob Seymour who ran over from the five. Again, Mastersoh converted.

The Stars got their first break in the third when Bill Dudley, Pittsburgh Steelers' back, snatched Zimmerman's short pass out of the air on his own 3 and raced 97 yards for the score.

The Stars went to work in earnest after that and with Luckman clicking repeatedly with passes to John Siegel and George Wilson, moved the ball to the Washington 3 from which point John Petty plunged over. The game was tied at 14-14 when Artoe connected for his winning field goal.

VOL LINESMEN TO RUSH GLEN DOBBS

New Orleans, Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—Tennessee's best pass defense against the aerials of Tulsa's All-American Glenn Dobbs in the Sugar Bowl game may be the constant rushing of the lightning-fast Volunteer linesmen.

As both teams, in training a few miles apart on the Mississippi Gulf coast, went into final two-day practice sessions today, Coach John Barnhill of Tennessee suggested that Tulsa might not be the only one to toss a few passes on New Year's Day.

But observers considered it a bit late in the season to start practicing an aerial attack that would approach the wizardry of the Dobbs variety, and believed that concentration on Tennessee power would be a better bet.

Red Ruffing Reports For Induction Exam

Santa Monica, Calif., Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—Righthander Charlie Ruffing, ace of the New York Yankees' pitching staff for the past decade, will report to his draft board today for a physical examination preparatory to induction.

Sammy Baugh's "Runout" to TECH AND TEXAS IN GREAT SHAPE

Philadelphia, Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—National Football Commissioner Elmer F. Layden today promised a "full investigation" into the failure of Sammy Baugh, Washington Redskins backfield star, to appear yesterday in the Redskins tilt with the All-Stars at Shibe Park.

Layden did not arrive in Philadelphia until yesterday, complicating last-minute efforts to bring Baugh here. Until Layden's arrival, George Strickler, league publicity director, was the only league representative formally assigned to Philadelphia for the benefit game for the United States fund.

Layden first indicated he did not consider it necessary to make any statement, but later released the following through Strickler: "I have no comment to make at this time. I have not heard from Baugh; I have been unable to reach him by phone. I have not contacted George Marshall (Redskins owner) and I have not had an opportunity to discuss the matter with Ray Flaherty (Redskins coach). I shall make a full investigation."

Baugh, it was learned, was due to arrive Dec. 23. A plane travel priority had been secured Dec. 18 for Sammy and Mrs. Baugh. It was reported later that Baugh was advised the reservation was made for him, but that he declined it.

When Baugh did not appear by Christmas Eve Flaherty assumed that Baugh had decided to spend Christmas at home with his family and that he would take a plane Christmas night.

Rangers Victorious But Stay In Cellar

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BOMBERS FLY TO SUN BOWL LOCALE

El Paso, Tex., Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—The undefeated Second Air Force Bombers of Spokane, Wash., will literally drop out of the sky into the Sun Bowl tomorrow, nursing five regulars but almost ready for their New Year's day football clash with the Hardin-Simmons Cowboys, likewise undefeated 1942 border conference champions.

Coach Red Reese's Spokane Bombers, service champions of the Pacific coast, hustled thru pre-game drills today at Tucson, Ariz., and surveyed their prospects for a stiff offensive attack in the Sun Bowl classic, with five regular squadmen, including Hal Van Every, former Minnesota star, and Bill-the-Kid Sewell, star passer, on the sick list.

After an early morning workout tomorrow, the army will load the air corps squad into Flying Fortresses for the dash to El Paso. The air-borne football team will begin last-minute practice sessions in the Sun Bowl stadium tomorrow afternoon.

SEGURA FAVORED IN TENNIS MEET

New Orleans, Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—Francisco Segura, the ambidextrous Ecuadorian, today was favored to replace Ensign Ted Schroeder as the Sugar Bowl tennis singles champion.

Second-seeded Segura meets George Pryor of Pittsburgh, a tournament dark horse, while the top-seeded Schroeder, national singles title-holder, plays his first round match against James Evert of Chicago.

Schroeder failed to arrive for the Saturday opening of the ninth annual tourney and his inability to get in a few practice games on the scene was expected to help Segura.

NEWARK SLUGGER TOPS INTERNATIONAL LOOP

New York, Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—Henry Majeski, right-handed slugger of the Newark Bears, compiled the highest percentage, collected the most hits and drove in the most runs to win individual honors in the International league batting race, official figures for 1942 showed today.

Majeski hit .345 to lead his nearest rival Gene Moore of Montreal by 30 points.

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GEORGIA, BRUINS IN HIGH SPIRITS AS CLASH NEARS

Injured Sinkwich Returns to Bulldog Camp — Uclans Take Five-Mile Hike.

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 28.—(U.P.)—The Rose Bowl picture today, just four days before the referee's whistle opens the New Year's Day gridiron classic, found the rival Georgia and UCLA camps displaying highest spirits yet shown in pre-game workouts, but for widely variant reasons.

The UCLAs just feel good. Despite an unusually heavy practice session Saturday, the Bruins asked Coach Babe Horrell for a workout Sunday. When he said no, the Bruin squad voluntarily went on a five-mile hike.

The Bulldogs are happier because All-America Frankie Sinkwich donned sweat clothes yesterday and jogged around the practice field until his twisted right ankle forced a halt. The Georgia sensation has either been in bed or confined to his hotel room since he sprained the ankle in practice early last week.

In the other camp, a knee injury suffered over the week-end by UCLA's 200-pound first string center, Bill Armstrong, was reported satisfactory. Coach Horrell said he would definitely start the big pivot man.

Rouen Conflagration Traced To Nazi Tank Ramming Aged House

Vichy (U.P.)—The burning of the historic quarter of Rouen between the cathedral and the Seine, one of the most perfect gems of middle ages architecture in Europe, in June, 1940, was blamed in a report by French experts today on a German tank.

According to the inquiry which lasted more than a year, the fire was traced finally to a German tank which tried to

force its way down one of the narrow tortuous streets from the cathedral. Towards the river end of the street, the German tank came into the line of fire of a French tank which put the German immediately out of action.

Its driver killed, its fuel on fire, the German tank rammed itself into the walls of a thirteenth century rubble and timber house which caught on fire. The flames spread to more than 400 houses, all dating to the middle ages.

There is now a vast void between the cathedral and the river, except for a few stone walls and arches, all that remains of one of the gems of European history. The French government's plans for the rebuilding the burned area with low structures so that the cathedral will be visible from the river. Before the fire, the cathedral had been wholly hidden from that side.

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The United States Army Awards the Order of the Purple Heart to Leo S. Disher, of the United Press

Major-General Lloyd R. Fredendall, of the A. E. F. in Africa, recently awarded the Order of the Purple Heart to United Press War Correspondent Leo S. Disher. The citation accompanying the award read:

"Leo S. Disher, Jr., while serving with a United States landing force in the capacity of war correspondent, at the harbor of Oran during the early morning hours of Nov. 8, 1942, distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism and meritorious performance of duty against an armed enemy during the attack on that port.

"In the face of withering enemy fire, although several times wounded, Disher remained at his post on the vessel which was taking him ashore and continued to report for the public press a lucid, accurate and detailed account of the action, in which the greater part of the military and naval personnel aboard the ship became casualties.

"After being ordered to abandon ship, Disher swam to shore and, although again wounded four times, continued to perform his duty in an exemplary manner. With complete disregard for his personal safety, Disher displayed great devotion to duty and rendered meritorious public service by recording the details of the attack on the harbor of Oran."
