POULTRY CEILING IS EXPECTED SOON

San Francisco, Dec. 29.—(U.P.)—Poultry ceiling prices at wholesale and producer levels will be effective in this area as soon as Office of Price Administration officials are satisfied the industry has been informed of the new regulations, it was disclosed today.

Originally declared effective Dec. 18 by Washington OPA offices, the price schedules were delayed in transmission to the coast.

The new prices, listed in broad classifications, are as follows: Leghorn broilers, all sizes, 28½¢; Leghorn fryers, 3 to 4 pounds, 30¢; colored roasters, 4 to 5 pounds, 33¢; 5½ pounds and over, 35¢; squabs, per pair, 55¢; colored pullets and domestic rabbits were not listed.

Poultry dealers estimated prices will take effect within a few days following conferences with OPA officials on some prices believed to be too low for this district.

NIPS HINT ECLIPSE FEATURE OF WAR

New York, Dec. 29.—(U.P.)—The Tokyo radio proclaimed today that an eclipse of the sun which will be seen in Japan on Feb. 5 is "a feature of the scientific war between Japan and America."

The Japanese broadcast, recorded by the Federal Communications Commission, said that "every possible preparation is being made to make certain that ultimate victory of the Japanese scientists in this war of science with America is achieved."

The total eclipse will be visible on Feb. 4 to American observers in eastern Alaska and the Aleutians, and a partial eclipse will be visible in some parts of the western United States.
