WAR TRANSFERS
ARTISTS' TOWN
IN CALIFORNIA

Carmel Changes From An
Escapist's Refuge to Community of Grim Reality.

Carmel, Calif. (U.P.)—War has changed this quaint artistic community, founded in the early 1900's by a group of San Francisco artists as a retreat where they might develop undisturbed their talents and idiosyncracies. Artists no longer wander aimlessly and bemused along the beach or rocky cliffs of the colony, for today army trucks roar up Ocean avenue.

War had left Carmel normal before the attack on Pearl Harbor last year—normal by Carmel's standards, that is, for the colony's ideas always have appeared a bit unconventional to the outside world.

Now, "war has revolutionized Carmel spiritually more than anything since it was founded in the early 1900's," comments Mrs. Elizabeth Cass, curator of the Carmel Art Association Galleries.

Many artists have left or are leaving, some for the army. The older group, which was the backbone of the colony, is spiritually depressed. Denied the freedom of the sea coast because of military restrictions, the artists have left in discouragement or turned their energies to the reality of civilian defense or military work.

Work as Camoufleurs
This is the chief change in the community—from an escapist's refuge it has become a town of reality. Paul Whitman, former president of the Carmel Art association, and Sam Colburn have been called to San Francisco as civilian camoufleur workers with the U. S. engineers. Royden Martin is doing camoufleur work at Fort Ord, following his recent return from similar activity in Florida.

John Cunningham now is with the merchant marine; Adrian Beach and Martin Gambee have been inducted into the army; Garth Jeffers, son of the poet Robinson Jeffers is in the army.

Arthur Hill Gilbert, William Ritschel, John O'Shea and Myron Oliver, the latter now president of the art association, are active in civilian defense. Armin Hanson, member of the National academy, and Paul Mays, noted for Monterey Bay fishing and marine scenes, have stopped painting because censorship prevents using those subjects.

Dr. Mary Levick retired here to paint, but the shortage of physicians forced her to abandon art to return to medical practice.

No Market for Paintings
Another deterrent to art is the fact that no one is buying works at the present time. Ferdinand Burdett, working on a civilian job at Fort Ord, is giving away his oil paintings to worthy persons in absence of a good market.

The war has had little influence on art itself, local art association leaders report. There are few new paintings, and shows which are held contain the same works as a year ago.

There are some bright aspects in the picture. This is furnished by the soldiers and service men themselves. An example was the July show arranged by Carol Stein-

beck, former wife of author John Steinbeck, and a citizen's committee. The show drew hundreds to see the work of soldiers in near-by camps and many paintings were sold.

The soldiers' work shows freshness and charm, but also nostalgia for civilian life. Camp and military scenes are subordinated to familiar home scenes of the Midwest or New England. Scores of soldiers attend the adult education art classes taught by Mrs. Pat Cunningham, despite the fact that the service men never know how soon they will be ordered elsewhere.

"Lone Cypress" Censored
The federal art and national defense project has been strongly supported here.

The war also has brought some refugees of note and ability here. Among them are Abel Warshawsky and Mr. and Mrs. Martin Baer, who were bombed out of France. Many are the brief visits of artists who come here to seek rest and peace after the horrors of war.

Another "beneficial" result of the war has been the censorship of "Lone Cypress," much painted and standard scene on the Peninsula. Declared the most photographed and painted subject in the world, the cypress has been eliminated for the duration—which Carmelites privately agree is a good thing.

Carmel has welcomed soldiers wholeheartedly—at the USO, at private homes, and at public functions. Daughters of wealthy Pebble Beach residents and Carmel tradesmen entertain simultaneously.

Carmel has changed, and old-timers who are left sometimes sigh for the peace of pre-war isolation and wonder whether the conditions will return to Carmel-by-the-Sea after the conflict.

The war situation has compelled Great Britain to expand the home-grown production of lumber five to eight times beyond normal capacity, and, instead of small quantities, more than a billion board feet of lumber is now derived from her forests.

New York, Dec. 29 (U.P.)—Albert D. Lasker, president and chief owner of Lord and Thomas, one of the largest and oldest advertising agencies in the nation, announced today that he was retiring to devote himself to public affairs.

He had retired in 1938 as president and director, but returned early this year because the company had lost some of its key officials. The agency will be taken over by a new firm, Foote, Cone and Belding. Emerson Foote, Fairfax M. Cone and Don Belding have been executive vice-presidents in charge of the agency's offices in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

AGENTS OF GIRAUD
VISIT ROOSEVELT

Washington, Dec. 29 (U.P.)—President Roosevelt today received two representatives of Gen. Henri Honoré Giraud who said afterward that they favored unification of all French forces in the fight to conquer Germany. The representatives of Giraud, new high commissioner of French North Africa, were Gen. M. E. Bethouart and J. L. DuBreuil. Here to coordinate the flow of military supplies to Giraud's army, they have set up headquarters at the war department and will remain in Washington indefinitely.

TOLO-CAMP ROAD
CONTRACT GIVEN

Salem, Ore., Dec. 29 (U.P.)—The state highway commission today announced award of the contract for the Tolo-Camp White access road project to the Tru-Mix Concrete Co. of Medford.

The contract figure was \$49,025.60 for 2.65 miles of grading, surfacing and oiling and construction of 57 feet of timber trestle.

The access road, according to Miles Stuart, co-owner of the Tru-Mix Concrete company, will branch off Kirkland road, which runs east from the Pacific highway just this side of the overhead bridge at Tolo, and enter the Camp White reservation on F street. The trestle, he said, will span Whistler creek. Construction will start shortly after the first of the year.
