COFFEE NOT FOR YOUNGER PERSONS

A person who was 14 years old at the time of his registration for war ration book one and is now 15 years old is not entitled to use war ration book one for coffee, the local board stated today. Only a person whose age is shown as 15 years or over on war ration book one is entitled to use his book to buy coffee.

In late registrations, local boards should enter on the war ration books of the applicant his age as of the date of the actual registration rather than his age as of the date of the sugar registration. In granting a replacement of a lost book the applicant's age at time of original registration must appear on the new war ration book one when issued.

RE-OPEN OLD MINES
Leadville, Colo.—(U.P.)—A zinc mining boom in Colorado during 1943 is in prospect, featuring the re-opening of old mines which have not seen service since World War I days. Charles W. Henderson, supervising engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, says the Leadville and San Juan regions will turn out great quantities of zinc. They were great producers of ore from 1902 to 1918 but mining was stopped when prices fell.

A. S. ROSENBAUM IS ONE-MAN BLITZ IN WAR BOND SELLING

Medford Man Disposes of \$150,000 in Last Two Months—State Over Top.

By the efforts of one man, A. S. Rosenbaum, war bond sales in Medford in the last two months have been boosted by \$150,000. This truly amazing fact was revealed by members of the Jackson county bond sales committee, headed by Mrs. Lela Rogers, who are every ready to sing the praises of Mr. Rosenbaum's selling feats.

A substantial part of the total figure are from sales made to members of the Medford Rotary club during the club's weekly luncheons. The plan of selling bonds each meeting was originated by Mr. Rosenbaum, and during the last two months has resulted in sales of about \$30,000 to club members. According to Leonard B. Mayfield, president of the club, the idea is spreading to other clubs in the district and the district governor has complimented the Medford organization on the excellent plan.

Ben F. Harder, member of the county selling committee, stated today that Oregon's state bond drive for the year amounted to sales of about \$100,000,000 according to a statement received from Ray Conway, state administrator. This is some \$500,000 over the quota set for the state.

Official complete figures will not be available until about January 4, it was said, when sales by counties will be reported.

CHRYSLER TANK OUTPUT FAR EXCEEDS SCHEDULE

Detroit, Jan. 1—(U.P.)—K. T. Keller, Chrysler Corporation president, said today the company's December tank output exceeded the entire production for 1941, when Chrysler tank production was already seven months ahead of schedule. Keller said the corporation broke all daily tank production records on Dec. 28 by making almost twice as many as on any other day. The plant also made several hundred more tanks during December than in its best previous month.

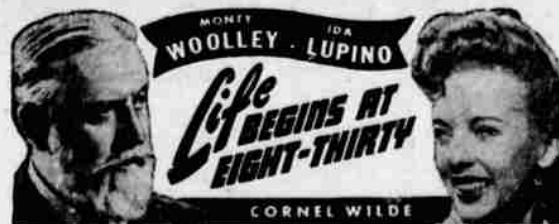
