NEW JAP OFFENSE IN GUINEA SEEN

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—Three heavy Allied air raids within five days on the important Japanese base at Rabaul, New Britain island, today indicated the possibility the enemy might be planning another major offensive against American and Australian forces on New Guinea.

The renewed air attacks upon Rabaul, 480 air miles northeast of Port Moresby, were considered significant because previous heavy raids have always occurred during periods of concentration of Japanese shipping or when harbor activity indicated that the enemy was getting ready for some offensive movement.

The Japanese might consider this a propitious time for reinforcing their beleaguered troops on New Guinea. Heavy rains that have soaked the north coast for several days, are hampering both land and air action.

New York, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—Frank Wells, Jersey City, N. J., had an unexpected and startling surprise last night while visiting his in-laws. He found a Negro infant, daintily clad in pink bunting and dress, in his automobile. The child was turned over to welfare authorities.

PRESIDENT FOR WEEK OF PRAYER

Washington, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt has endorsed the appeal of the Federal Council of Churches to the American people to observe this week as a universal week of prayer. Dr. Samuel McCrea Cavert, general secretary of the inter-church body, said today.

The general theme to be emphasized throughout the week is "Faith Giveth the Victory." The president's message as released by the council:

"The observance of a week of universal prayer, to be carried out under the auspices of the Federal Council of Churches, will, I hope, remind us of the need for constant rededication throughout the long ordeal that is ahead of us. For without spiritual armor we cannot hope to win this war. Without spiritual armor we cannot be worthy of the victory our men are purchasing at a great cost on the battlefield. Without spiritual armor we cannot hope to play an honorable and responsible part in the establishment of world peace."

TRUCKMEN'S WOES DUE FOR BOOST

Washington, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—The Office of Defense Transportation tonight warned the trucking industry it faces a new—perhaps even more serious—combination of problems in 1943 than it faced in 1942.

It will have to cope with rapidly growing shortages of manpower, parts, tires and vehicles, ODT said.

The ODT added a warning to operators who depend on a "miracle" to keep their trucks in operation: "You're heading for trouble." No truck owner in the United States—from the farmer to corner grocer with a single delivery truck to the big fleet owner—will be immune from these headaches, ODT said.

Mexico City, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—Sixteen persons were killed, 118 injured and several are missing as a result of New Year's eve celebrations here, police and hospital records showed today. Twenty-four persons were jailed on charges of insulting policemen.

LONGER WEEK FOR PARK PERSONNEL

An order increasing the working week of the Crater Lake National Park staff from 44 to 48 hours was received yesterday morning by E. P. Leavitt, superintendent. The order was received by wire from park headquarters this morning and was to take effect immediately.

A similar order was received last week by the staff of the Rogue River National Forest, going into effect last Saturday. Both offices will now remain open all day on Saturday, instead of closing at noon.

It is thought by other local employees of federal, or federally supervised institutions, that similar orders will be put into effect in the near future.

Washington, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—Crown Prince Olaf of Norway arrived here last night by plane from Europe, via New York, for a visit with his wife, Princess Martha, and their two children. The Norwegian embassy said there was no political significance to the visit.

NO BANKS IN FRANCE

New York, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—Alan V. Arragon, banker, arriving at LaGuardia field today aboard a Pan-American Clipper, asserted that commercial banking has virtually disappeared in France.

DARLAN SUSPECTS STILL INTERNED

Allied Headquarters, North Africa, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—An official spokesman said tonight that the 12 men arrested on Gen. Henri Honoré Giraud's orders early this week were being held in "administrative internment."

The government investigated whether they were implicated in the death of Admiral Jean François Darlan or plotted the death of Giraud and Robert Murphy, President Roosevelt's representative.

Giraud said in a press conference Dec. 30 that he had ordered the arrests only after he was certain the men had participated in the Darlan plot or were plotting against Murphy and himself.
