New York, Jan. 6—(UP)—Stocks turned irregular today as the time approached for delivery of President Roosevelt's message to congress on the state of the nation. Trading lightened. Wall street anticipated a fighting message asking for more sacrifices, higher taxes, ceiling on income from securities at \$25,000 annually, and further diversion of civilians to wartime industry. Traders said the new congress may nullify some of the president's requests but felt that their statement would unsettle the market.

STUDENTS START TIN CAN ROUNDUP JANUARY 11 HERE

Housewives to Have Salvage Ready For Pick Up—Prizes For Best Collectors.

Get your tin cans ready, housewives, because the students of Medford public schools are starting their "tin can campaign" Jan. 11. E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, said that the local campaign will run for one school week and will be followed by another at a later date. Purpose is to pick up all cans available to date and then allow for another accumulation rather than having small contributions during the coming months.

Tin cans, when properly prepared, it was stated, do not use much space as they can be folded compactly and placed in a box for collection. Housewives are asked to remove the label from the can, wash can thoroughly, remove both ends, flatten can and insert ends and place in a box for collection.

Prizes Offered
The campaign by the students is being conducted on a basis of home rooms in junior and senior high school and grades in the grade schools with prizes in each school for the instructor and room which brings in the largest per capita amount of tin cans. Details of the prizes are to be announced later, Hedrick stated. This tin can contribution is being conducted on a nationwide basis to supply necessary metal to smelters for defense activities. It is anticipated that Medford residents will cooperate wholeheartedly in this campaign which is under the sponsorship of the school students.
