

61,126 CASUALTIES LISTED FOR U. S. SINCE WAR ENTRY

36,528 in Army; 23,254 in Navy—U. S. Civilians Interned by Axis Total 4,226

Washington, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—Announced American casualties since the outbreak of the war totaled 61,126 today, according to the Office of War Information. That includes killed, wounded, missing, interned in neutral countries, and prisoners of war.

The army's casualties as of Dec. 20 were 36,528. Of that number, 2,193 were killed, 3,948 were wounded, 29,205 are missing, 1,016 are prisoners of war and 106 are interned in neutral countries. Out of the 3,948 wounded, 699 have returned to duty.

The navy department has reported 23,254 casualties—excluding prisoners of war, which are reported by the provost marshal. That includes:

Navy—Dead, 4,657; wounded, 1,769; missing, 8,970.

Marine Corps—Dead, 1,201; wounded, 1,653; missing, 1,943.

Coast Guard—Dead, 51; wounded, 19; missing, 134.

Merchant Marine—Dead, 429; wounded, 0; missing, 2,428.

The provost marshal's office has announced that 575 navy men and 769 marines are prisoners of war.

The combined Axis powers have interned 4,226 U. S. civilians to date, the provost marshal's office said. Of this total 2,648 are held by the Japanese, 1,557 are held in Germany, and 21 are held by the Italians.

FORMER RESIDENT OF C. P. SUCCUMBS

William L. Hathaway, 55, a nursery operator, died Dec. 19, 1942, in an Exeter, Cal., hospital, after a week's illness. It was learned here today.

Mr. Hathaway was born at Kerby, Ore., in 1887, and resided there until 5 years old. With his parents and two brothers he moved to Central Point, Ore., where he grew to manhood and received his education in the Central Point schools.

In 1917 he, with his brother Jay, went to Visalia, Cal., where they bought a farm. After four years they entered the nursery business, specializing in ornamental shrubs and flowers.

Mr. Hathaway was a man of fine character and leaves a host of friends to mourn his passing. The last two years he helped care for his invalid father, who preceded him in death just seven weeks.

He leaves to mourn his loss, two brothers, Ernest Hathaway of San Jose, Cal., and Jay C. Hathaway, of Visalia, Cal., and one sister, Mrs. Clara Wortman, of Willows, Cal.

He was laid to rest beside his parents in the cemetery at Visalia, Cal., Dec. 21.
